THIRTYSECOND ANNUAL REPORT (April 1, 1993 to March 31, 1994)

1. THE INSTITUTE

The Indian Institute of Management Calcutta (IIMC) was the first national Institute established by the Government of India in 1961 to spearhead professional management in Indian industry, business and government. Cooperating with the Government of India in this effort were the Alfred P. Sloan School of Management of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the Government of West Bengal, the Ford Foundation and the business community. It now forms an integral part of the Government of India's efforts to promote professional management in India. IIMC moved into its 33rd year on November 14, 1993. During this period it has grown from strength to strength and is today playing a major role in the task of improving management practices in India. More than 2990 alumni are in position of strategic importance in industry today - in India as well as abroad. In addition, a large number of senior managers from Indian industry and Government have had the benefit of interaction with IIMC through its Executive Development Programmes, Extension Programmes and Consultancy assignments. The Institute attaches great importance to research which is devoted to problems of management and those of development. Indeed, management of development is a major focus of the Institute's range of activities.

One more year of fruitful activities has been completed. The Institute continued to focus its research and training activities on Public Enterprises, Project Management, Environment Management and Rural Development for which separate activity centres exist. Another area in which the Institute has been working and will continue its endeavour with greater emphasis is in the use of computers for solving management problems. Information on the different activities of the Institute and the efforts it has continued to make to ensure the maintenance of high standards of performance are provided in this report.

2. SOCIETY AND THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Institute was constituted on November 14, 1961 as a Society under the Societies' Registration Act. It is administered by the Board of Governors. The Chairman of the Board is appointed by the Government of India in consultation with the Government of West Bengal. Other members of the Board include nominees of the Central and the State Governments, representatives from constituencies like education, commerce, industry, labour and other interests. The Director of the Institute and two nominees of the Institute's Faculty are also members of the Board of Governors. A substantial part of the annual recurring and non-recurring expenses of the Institute is provided by the Government of India.

3. OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTE

The objectives of the Institute are:

- * To direct the education and development of young men and women along specific lines so as to match the management needs of industrial and other types of organizations.
- * To establish an infrastructure which would provide practicing managers with the opportunity to acquaint themselves with management concepts, techniques and research.
- * To establish a rapport between management scientists and industrial decision-makers through consultancy and training programmes aimed at facilitating problem solving in organization.
- * To build a Centre of Advanced Management providing opportunities for innovative research and promoting the development of indigenous literature on management.

Since its establishment, the Institute has been channelizing all efforts and resources to accomplish its objectives.

A.1. POST GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

The two-year Post Graduate Programme in Management is a full-time residential course for graduates from all disciplines. The 30th session of the Programme began in July 1993 with 242 students from all over the country in the First Year and 212 students in the Second Year. The number of Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe students in the First and Second Year were 48 and 30 respectively. There were a total of 26 girl students (including 9 SC/ST students) in the First Year and 22 students in the Second Year. Although 242 students were admitted in the first year which included 15 belonging to the 29th Batch, who were repeating their terms, the strength came down subsequently to 225 (at the end of the III Term). This drop was caused by withdrawals during the middle of the programme.

The Post Graduate Programme (PGP) of the Institute is designed for students desiring to embark upon careers in management, who are willing and able to devote two complete academic years in pursuing studies in management education. Students from all over India continue to be attracted to the Programme. It is the core activity of the Institute designed to meet the challenges of rapid changes in our society. The students are continually encouraged to deal with unstructured situations and evolve solutions to complex problems. The main thrust is to imbibe a sense of strategic outlook to management problems in the students; to develop in them a global view of economic, technological, cultural and political environment of the business; to help them to acquire ability to face uncertainties and challenges of a global economy with great amount of flexibility. To provide a basis for this approach to learning, the First Year of the Programme is devoted to developing a working knowledge of Economic Principles, Principles of Organisation and Behaviour, Financial and Accounting Systems and Quantitative Methods for solution of management problems.

The academic year at the Institute is divided into three terms each consisting of about twelve working weeks. The Programme requires six terms of full-time work. Due to the nature of the learning process which requires a full-time involvement rather than just the attendance in classes, the Programme is entirely residential. The students are continuously graded, not only on their performance in the examinations but also on class participation, home assignments, projects, presentations, etc. In the First Year, all the courses are compulsory. In the Second Year, the students are allowed a choice of 13 electives over three terms along with three compulsory courses. In the summer between the First and the Second Year, the students are expected to gain practical experience through related employment. Apart from helping the students to supplement their academic knowledge through practical exposure, this aids them in their selection of Second Year electives.

The Institute's faculty use different pedagogical tools to facilitate learning. The Institute believes that the method of instruction for maximising learning varies from course to course and so uses varying proportions of the case study methods, lectures, group exercises and project work.

The students after completing the Diploma at the Institute have fairly exciting careers ahead. The period covering the next few years in our country will see rapid changes and the Institute's educational programme should take these into account in its courses. The teaching programmes of the Institute are, therefore, designed to help the students to develop a base from which they continue to learn. The programme stresses conceptual and analytical reasoning while providing students with the knowledge of the current state of business and the decision models used by managers today.

More than 2990 young managers have graduated from the Institute and are today occupying important positions.

A.1(1) Admission

Students are admitted to the Post-Graduate Programme on the basis of their interests, aptitude and capacity for undergoing a rigorous programme of study in management sciences, as indicated by previous academic records, scores in the admission test, performance in group discussions and interview, and also work experience.

The applicants should hold at least a Bachelor's degree in any field including arts, physical sciences, commerce, engineering and the social sciences, or professional diploma considered equivalent to a Bachelor's degree, with the following minimum requirements:

- (i) 50% marks (45% for SC/ST candidates) in SSC or SSLC, High School, Higher Secondary or Senior Cambridge or Recognised School Terminal Examination of any Board/University. Where 10+2 system is followed candidates must have 50% marks (45% for SC/ST candidates) in aggregate in any one of the examinations either at the end of 10th year or at the end of the plus two phase; and
- (ii) 50% marks in aggregate (45% for SC/ST candidates) in Bachelor's degree.

One of the methods of judging the fitness of a candidate to the Programme is the Common Admission Test (CAT) administered jointly by Indian Institutes of Management at Ahmedabad, Bangalore, Calcutta and Lucknow.

1.1(2) 30th Post Graduate Programme (1993-95)

A total of 15615 candidates applied for admission to the 30th Session of Post Graduate Programme commencing in June'93, including 724 Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes candidates.

Out of 15615 applicants for admission, 1021 candidates were called for personal interviews and group discussions by a panel consisting of faculty members of the Institute, experts from Industry and Government and alumni at 4 metropolitan cities of the country namely, Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Madras. Out of 1021 candidates selected for personal interview, 199 candidates belonged to SC/ST community. Ultimately, after going through the selection procedure, a total number of 242 students were admitted into the 30th Session of the Post Graduate Programme.

A.1(3) Educational background of the 30th Batch of Students

A study of the educational background of the students of the 30th Session (1993-95), who are now in the second year reveals that 82.7% belonged to engineering stream and 17.3% belonged to non-engineering stream.

A.1(4) Reservation for SC/ST candidates

22.5% seats of the Post Graduate Programme are reserved for candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes/Tribes community and same relaxation in entry standard was extended to them as in the earlier years. A total of 724 applications for admission to the Programme (1993-95) was received from candidates belonging to SC/ST community. Out of this 199 candidates were called for personal interview and in all 43 candidates joined the Programme.

A.1(5) 31st Session of Post Graduate Programme (1994-96)

The Common Admission Test (CAT) for selecting students for the 31st session of the Post Graduate Programme (1994-96) commencing in June, 1994 was held on December 12, 1993 all over India in 19 Centres.

The 5 examination centres at Bhubaneswar, Calcutta, Guwahati, Nagpur and Patna were under the control of IIMC, which catered to a total of 4665 candidates.

The CAT (Written Test) was common for IIM Ahmedabad; IIM Bangalore; IIM Calcutta and IIM Lucknow. The number of candidates appeared at the CAT all over India were about 25,100.

b) No. of students who joined in IIM Calcutta were 274 (including 54 SC/ST), out of which 5 dropped out subsequently. The number 274 includes 11 students belonging to the 30th Batch who were repeating their 1st year term.

A.1(6) Curriculum

For the Post-Graduate Programme, the principal fields of study include Economics, Statistics, Operations research, Behavioural sciences, Sociology, History and Law, Economic, Social and Political Environment of Enterprises, applied fields of Marketing, Production, Finance, Personnel Management, Labour Relations, Materials Management, Management Information Systems, Management Policy, Organizational Communication and Decision Making, Managerial Accounting and Control and Regional Development. Courses are arranged on the basis of minimum of 30 contact hours spread over a quarter. The first year courses covered by Terms 1 to III are compulsory for all the students. During the second year, Indian Legal System (Term IV), Manage-ment Policy (Term V) and Management Games (Term VI) are also compulsory courses for all the students. In addition, the students are required to work on a project during the summer between the first and the second year of study. Summer Projects are meant for those students who have completed the First Year of the Post-Graduate Programme success-fully. Each student is required, as a compulsory part of the curriculum, to spend about eight weeks of the period May-June working on a project specified by an employer and to submit a report to the sponsoring authority. The students work under the guidance of a faculty member who finally evaluates the project report. The summer project is assigned a weightage equivalent to that of one course in the curriculum. A list of Organisations where the Post-Graduate Programme students worked for their Summer Project in May-June 1993 is given in Annexure-V.

The Institute does not offer any specialisation package. However, it is possible for the students to choose optional courses with concentration in areas of their choice in their second year, keeping in view the current requirements for specialisation/ concentration for placement purposes. As already indicated above, the courses, Strategic Management, Indian Legal System and Management Games are compulsory for the second year students. The list of Optional Courses offered in the Post Graduate Programme is shown in Annexure-VI.

As in previous years, this year also, a number of senior practicing managers were invited to supplement the efforts of the Institute faculty, as visiting faculty, to expose the students to real life problems.

A.1(7) Colloquia Series

The series was immensely successful in achieving its objectives in the year 1993-94. A large number of leading professionals from industry and corporate circles shared their views and experiences with the students and the faculty members of IIMC on a wide range of topics in management.

A.1(8) Financial Assistance, Scholarship and Prizes

The Institute provided during the year financial assistance to 68 students (including 61 SC/ST students) enrolled in the Post Graduate Programme (both first and second year). The assistance is of the value of Rs.170/- per month per student for 10 months in the academic year (or Rs.1700/- per annum), in addition to the full remission of tuition fees (for SC/ST students, room rent also) for the year. There were 5 students who were getting the NCERT Scholarship (Rs.1500/- per year). Besides, 53 meritorious students studying in the 2nd year worked as tutors for the 1st year students in different subjects during the year for which they were paid some stipend.

The Institute awards the following prizes to the meritorious students:

- i) B.C. Roy Memorial Medals (Gold for 1st Rank Holder and Silver for 2nd Rank Holder).
- ii) Chairman's Prize For 1st Rank Holder.
- iii) John Wynne Prize For 1st Rank Holder.

A.1(10) System of Evaluation

Students are evaluated on the basis of examinations, reports, take home assignments, term papers, class performance, seminars, regular tests, surprise quizzes and oral examinations as determined by the faculty member concerned. Sometimes, in courses involving group methods of teaching, students play a major role in grading each other.

A.1(11) The Passing Standard and the Diploma

Marks under the grade-point system are used in evaluating a student's performance in each term and in the two-year Programme as a whole. To graduate, a student must obtain an average of at least 5.0 in all courses, taken on credit in the Post-Graduate Programme. Generally, in order to be promoted to the Second Year, a student should obtain an average of at least 4.5 at the end of the Third Term. A student who achieves an average of less than 4.5 at the end of the third term may sometimes be permitted to continue, subject to satisfactory fulfillment of conditions stipulated by the Faculty according to the merits of the case. However, a student once admitted must fulfil all requirements for the Diploma within three academic years.

For the Weaker Section of the Students, effective from the 28th Batch (1991-93), a Slow Paced Scheme (SPS) has been introduced. A student having Grade Point Average (GPA) less than 3.40 at the end of Term I is transferred to the SPS. A Student under this scheme is required to fulfil the requirements for the Post Graduate Diploma in Management within 36 months of his admission to the Programme (as against the normal period of 24 months). There are now four students in the 3rd year belonging to the 28th Batch, under this scheme.

Those who successfully complete the Programme are awarded the Post-Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM), which has been recognised as equivalent to a Master's Degree in Business Administration by the Ministry of Education, Government of India, the Association of Indian Universities (formerly the Inter-University Board of India and Ceylon) and foreign Universities who have admitted our students into their doctoral programmes.

A.1(12) Students' Participation

IIMC has been in the forefront in allowing students participation in activities which are student related. Elected student representatives sit on the PGP Committee, Fellow Programme Committee, Placement Committee, Library Committee etc. along with faculty and administration and help to decide on vital policy matters.

Every student is a member of the Students' Association, which has a President, Beral Secretary and Treasurer. Students themselves, through their elected representatives, organise Mess, Sports, Colloquia, Debates and Quizzes, Music and other social activities.

A.1(13) Placement

The Placement Programme of 1993-94 involved a stupendous task in view of the larger batch size of 181 students (compared to 1992-93 when the batch size was 118 students). Here, ten students did not avail of the placement services due to domestic and personal collems, prior agreements with their sponsors to the Post-Graduate Programme, etc. The challenge of placing a larger batch was faced through inviting as many organisations as possible to participate in the campus interviews and trying to satisfy the varied requirements of the different employers as well as the aspirations of the students. With this objective, plans and programmes were drawn up meticulously and proper strategies evolved so that all students could find their final placement.

The Placement Programme of 1993-94 was more successful than in any other previous year in terms of number of offers received, the profile of the companies which participated and the quality of jobs offered. While the official calendar of campus recruitment was for 9 consecutive days from the 19th February, 1994, all the students except one got placed six days time, during which 196 offers were made to 170 students by 54 companies. The one ident left out also got placed on the 7th day. In view of this, 14 companies scheduled on the day and onwards had to be informed about the unavailability of students.

Some of the highlights of this year's placement are given below:

- Out of the batch of 181 students, 171 students availed of the placement service. A total of 197 offers were made to the students by 55 companies, out of which 44 (80%) belonged to the Private Sector. Details in this regard are given in Annexure-XII.
- The categories of organisations which participated in the Placement Programme were more in number than in the past and represented a wide variation of business interests. There were 15 Consumer Products Companies, 19 Banks and

Financial Institutions, 4 Consultancy Firms, 6 Industrial Goods Manufacturers, 5 Computer Manufacturers and Software Companies, 2 Pharmaceutical Companies and 4 Miscellaneous industries (in all 55 companies).

- The highest number of offers were made by ICICI (they selected 12 students). The most prized offer was that of McKinsey, who selected 4 students and other notable offers included HCL-HP and ITW Signode choosing 7 students each, Maruti and Ogilvey & Mather taking 6 students each, Standard Chartered Bank, ITC Classic, Procter & Gamble and Asian Paints each taking 5 students, Seagram and Unilever Group selected 4 students.
- Another interesting trend of this year's placement was the acceptance of record number of jobs (63) in the Banks (19) and Financial Institutions (44), despite the fact that students of this Institute predominantly have an engineering background.
- The batch had 19 SC/ST candidates. It is heartening to note that all of them were easily placed despite facing intense competition from their fellow students belonging to the general category.
- Ten new organisations visited the campus for the first time during this Placement Season. Details in this regard are given in Annexure-XI.
- The batch had 63 students with prior work experience. Employers had suitably rewarded those students for their experience through offering higher remuneration and/or giving lesser probation period in their initial offers.
- As before, a larger number of students accepted the job offers from the Private Sector. Only 39 (about 23%) students were absorbed by the Public Sector. However, there was a significant increase in the acceptance of jobs in the Public Sector Companies like ICICI, Exim Bank, IDBI, UTI, SBI Mutual Fund, SBI Capital Markets etc. It was also to be noted that the highest number of jobs (12) were made by ICICI. Details of placement, sectorwise, functional areawise and on the basis of nature of jobs during the last 5 years are given in Annexure-X.
- There has been a remarkable increase in the starting salary. This year, the salary range was from Rs.52,800/- p.a. to Rs.3,20,000/- p.a. The highest salary (Rs.3,20,000/-) was for jobs in McKinsey. The average salary accepted this year has been Rs.1,00,624/- p.a., as compared to the average salary of Rs.74,892/- p.a. last year (an increase of 25%). The salary distribution in the offers made this year is shown in Annexure-XIII.
- This year there has been a better spread of students over various functional areas. The functional and areawise classification of job offers made to the students is given in Annexure-XIV.

- Another notable feature had been the corporate sponsorship of the Placement Brochure. The practice was started last year with TISCO donating Rs.1 lakh. ITW Signode were the sponsors this year (partly).
- The companies who wanted to come for taking interviews for recruiting boys in the first 4 days of the campus recruitment period were charged, as in 1992-93, Rs.10,000/- and, in addition, they were charged Rs.6,000/- for each student joining them after recruitment. For companies wanting to come for taking interviews after 4th day were charged Rs.5,000/- and, in addition, they were to pay Rs.6,000/- for each student so recruited, joining them.
- Summer Placement this year was good despite the larger size of the 30th batch (225 students). The Summer Placement started in November'93 and completedby March'94. Students accepted offers for placement from as many as 63 companies. The projects offered were quite relevant in terms of Summer Training objectives and overall students' satisfaction with the Summer Projects offered was high.

A. 1(14) Extra Curricular Activities

Excellent opportunities for extra-curricular development forms an integral part of the traditions and facilities of the Institute. The students run extra curricular clubs in photography, hiking, investment simulation, film appreciation and sports, football, basketball, tennis, cricket, hockey, badminton, carrom, table tennis, chess and bridge are regularly played on campus. The Hiking Club organised treks to Sandak-phu, Dzongri (Sikkim) and Nepal during the year. In literary and cultural activities, the students participate in various national competitions in debates, quizzes, music and other related activities. As a part of tradition, the Institute annually conducts a QDM (Quiz, Debate and Music) Cultural Festival in Calcutta. This Festival was conducted this year also at the Campus. The students host a National Business School Meet every year with an aim to increase inter action among the various Business Schools all over the country. This year's meet was held at the Campus during January 7-10,1994, which was inaugurated by Shri K.L. Chugh, Chairman, ITC and a Member on the Board of Governors of the Institute. Teams from IIM Ahmedabad, IIM Lucknow, XLRI, Jamshedpur XIM, Bhubaneswar, Symbiosis, TSM and Birla Institute of Management, Ranchi, took part in a variety of events. A panel discussion on the "Entry of MNCs" was also held on this occasion.

1.1(15) Alumni Association

The Association consists of the Institute's alumni passing out of the Post-Graduate Programme and the Fellowship Programme as well as the Executive Develop-ment Programmes and the Extension Programmes. It serves as a meeting forum for them to keep in touch with each other and with the Institute. The Association is based in Calcutta and has its chapters in Bombay, Delhi, Bangalore and Madras. Efforts are being made to set up more chapters. The alumni helps in course modifications and selection of incoming students.

The students and alumni quite often get together both formally, in seminars and lectures organized in collaboration with each other, as well as informally at the Institute and at the latter's offices.

During 1993-94, stress was laid to update the alumni database and make it as comprehensive as possible. Besides the formal activities conducted by the various chapters, a loan fund was also formed for the purpose of partially meeting the fee expenditure of some students. This loan is awarded on Merit-cum-Means basis. All efforts are made to have greater interaction between IIMC and its alumni through series of activities.

A.2. FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

Within few years of conducting the Post-Graduate Programme in Management it became evident that neither training nor education in management sciences and practices can remain effective unless its knowledge base is continuously expanded and enriched mainly through research. There were other compulsions also. The need for analysing the experience of management in the Indian environment was strongly felt and urged by many. There was also a large expansion programme for management education in the universities and the need for competent faculty was growing.

All these compulsions continue to exist to this day. Meanwhile we have had about two decades experience in running our Doctoral Level Programme which is known as the Fellow Programme of the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta.

This experience has included a stage of early experimentation, gradual consolidation and a recent review.

We have identified our Institute's goals and objectives afresh in the context of the changing environment. We find that the demand and expectations from a national institute like ours, pioneers in the field of management education, have grown beyond the boundaries of the familiar corporate industrial sector. Management problems must be viewed against the background of national attempts at economic restructuring and globalisation of Indian business. The implications of the broad macro-economic policy changes must filter into our business strategies and management policy formulation. At the same time there is an urgent need to improve the infrastructure leading to better quality of life. This means an improvement or upgradation of public systems dealing with the management of energy, environment, communication and information technology, health, education and transport. Thus, we can no longer confine ourselves within the limits of our initial activities. Our Doctoral Programme in management education must reflect these new concerns.

In this context we have redefined our objectives for the Fellow Programme, reemphasised the need for our Institute as a parent institute for nurturing young researchers and potential academics in management sciences. Management sciences are essentially derived through application of techniques of observation, analysis and conceptualisation, from the basic disciplines in the social sciences, quantitative sciences and the behavioural sciences, apart from the applied aspects of management in the functional fields of production, marketing, finance, etc.

This multi-disciplinary content of management sciences is in fact the strength and raison d'etre of IIMC. Therefore, as a result of our review, we have completely restructured our Fellow Programme allowing specialisation in all branches of management sciences including the basic disciplines.

We are convinced that the recognition of the basic strength and origin of management sciences is crucial at this stage of development of the study of Management in India. We hope our new curricula will attract and interest the kind of talent which must be brought in for the enrichment of Management Sciences as a full fledged discipline.

Our primary aim is to encourage a whole generation of academics in the field, but it is also of enormous benefit to Industry and the Government, at corporate and policy-making levels, where expertise of a type which combines a perception of the broader linkages along with an intimate knowledge of functions at the operational level is necessary.

The Fellow Programme which was started from the 1971 academic session, is now in its twentyfourth year and making steady progress. From the year 1980, the Fellow Programme has been offering opportunities for specialisation in Management and in various related disciplines.

At present there are 21 students who are at various phases of their course work/research in the Programme.

As of now 50 students have been awarded the title "Fellow of Indian Institute of Management Calcutta". They are all gainfully employed in teaching, research, consultancy and other pursuits. Some have joined foreign universities for further studies.

A.2.(1) Admission

In 1991-92, the need to take the Research Orientation Identification Test (ROIT) in addition to Common Admission Test (CAT) for securing admission to Fellow Programme was dispensed with. For the programme which commenced in July'93, there were 367 applications. 330 took the examination. Based on the results 56 + 4 (PGDM) candidates were called for interview; 32 candidates appeared in the interview, 13 were selected and offers sent and 9 (3 in the 2nd year and 6 in the 1st year) joined. For the programme which would commence in July'94, 464 applications were

received, out of which 291 took the test. A total of 62 candidates [including 2 PGDM holders (who need not appear in the CAT) were called for interview which was scheduled for early April 1994.

A.2.(2) Programme Objectives

The Fellow Programme is a full-time doctoral level programe in different fields of Management as well as in various disciplines and areas related to Management. The objective of the programme is to prepare students for careers in teaching and research in management or in the related disciplines and also for positions requiring continued advanced research and consultancy experience.

- A.2.(2)(i) The Fellow Programme in Management offers specialization in the following areas:
 - i) Behavioural Sciences
 - ii) Finance and Control
 - iii) Management Information Systems
 - iv) Marketing
 - v) Operations Management
 - vi) Personnel Management and Industrial Relations.
- A.2.(2)(ii) Besides Fellow Programme in Managemet, there are six other Fellow Programmes in pure disciplines related to management, namely:
 - a) Economics
 - b) Mathematics for Management
 - c) Operations Research & Systems Analysis
 - d) Regional Development
 - e) Sociology
 - f) Statistics

A.2.(3) The Title

The title "Fellow of the Indian Institute of Management-Calcutta" is awarded to the students on successful completion of the Programme.

A.2.(4) Ph.D. Recognition

The Fellowship in Management and the Fellowship in the six areas related to Management are recognised as being equivalent to a Ph.D. by the Association of Indian Universities. The Government of India also has recognised the Fellowship in Management of this Institute as equivalent to Ph.D. Degree in management of a recognised Indian University.

A.2.(5) Eligibility for Admission

The applicant must possess a post-graduate degree in management or equivalent professional qualification or a post-graduate degree in any discipline and must have secured at least 55% marks or its equivalent and minimum 50% aggregate marks at the Bachelors degree level. Graduates in Engineering, that is, with B.Tech. or B.E. degree, may also apply, provided

they have secured a first class or its equivalent. In addition, all applicants must ensure that they have obtained minimum 50% aggregate marks in either the Secondary of Higher Secondary Examination (or equivalent) held by Board/University. Candidates who are otherwise eligible but are yet to complete their bachelors degree in engineering or masters degree in any relevant discipline can also apply. Such candidates, if selected, will be provisionally admitted provided they complete all requirements for obtaining the degree before 30th June. For SC/ST candidates, the eligibility conditions are relaxed. All applicants are required to take the Common Admission Test (CAT) of the Indian Institutes of Management. Announcement of the procedure for appearing in the Common Admission Test is made in leading newspapers in September every year for admission into the programme beginning in July, next year.

Those who qualify in the CAT and who meet the eligibility criteria set above are called for interview around the middle of April. Candidates are first interviewed by the faculty of the area to which they are applying. Those who qualify the first round are then interviewed by the Fellow Programme (FP) Committee which makes the final selection. Applicants are informed of the decision around the last week of April. A PGDM holder of any of the Indian Institutes of Management, who wishes to enter the Fellow Programme, need not take the CAT, if his/her cumulative grade point average (CGPA) is 6.00/9.00 and above or its equivalent. He can apply directly in the prescribed Fellow Programme Application Form. After submission of the application form, the selection procedure regarding such candidates will be identical to that of other candidates. If his/her CGPA is less than 6.00/9.00 he should take the written test and go through the admission procedure like any other candidate. Graduates of the four IIMs applying for the Fellow Programme in Management (FPM), who have a CGPA of 6.00/9.00 and above (or its equivalent) are also automatically eligible for direct admission to the 2nd year of the Fellow Programme. Applicants with the equivalent of a PGDM from any of the universities with a CGPA of 6.00/9.00 or equivalent, may request direct admission to the second year and this may be granted at the discretion of the Fellow Programme Committee. Students with a Master's degree or more, in any of the pure discipline areas, can also be admitted directly to the 2nd year of Fellow Programme in that area.

A.2.(6) Outline of the Programme

The programme consists of course work followed by a dissertation. The course work phase is of two year duration covering six terms. Waivers may be granted from particular courses to suitably qualified candidates on the basis of their prior proficiency. On satisfactory completion of the course work with the requisite CGPA, a Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (CQE) is held. After qualifying in the CQE, the student is required to submit his/her dissertation proposal to an interdisciplinary Thesis Advisory Committee consisting of thesis supervisors and two other faculty members. Finally, the student write the dissertation which is evaluated by a Thesis Examination Committee (including external experts) and the student publicly defends his dissertation before the Thesis Evaluation Committee.

A.2.(7) Duration of the Programme

The normal duration of the programme is four years for those who enter in the first year and three years for those who enter in the second year. Two years are spent on course work and two years on dissertation. Students who join in the second year spend only one year

on course work. For various reasons some students require more than two years to complete the dissertation. Students are therefore allowed to continue upto four years after course work, upon reports of satisfactory progress from the Thesis Adviser. However, there is a time limit of eight years for the completion from the year of entry beyond which only under very exceptional circumstances will a student be allowed extension. Every student admitted to the Fellow Programme is placed under the guidance of an Academic Adviser to help him to organize his academic programme, specially in the selection of optional courses during the first two years.

A.2.(8) <u>Fees</u>

No tuition fee is charged. However, the charges for Hostel Room Rent @ Rs.2000/- per annum, Students' Association Fee of Rs.200/- per year and Registration Fee of Rs.100/- per year, are compulsory. A Caution Deposit of Rs.500/-, which is refundable under certain conditions after completion of the programme, is payable by the student on acceptance of the offer of admission.

A student who prefers to drop out voluntarily from the programme or is required to leave the Programme under F.P. Rules will forfeit his/her Caution Deposit.

In addition, a dissertation fee of Rs.200/- is payable at the time of submission of the dissertation.

The Institute reserves the right to charge any other fees upon the students or to increase the rate of any fee which may be considered necessary for meeting the expenses incurred on them, after giving due notice.

A.2.(9) Financial Aid

A student is awarded a scholarship, which ranges from Rs.1800/- to Rs.2500/-p.m. In addition there is a contingency grant of Rs.5000/- per year payable under the Rules of the Fellow Programme. If the student's research work in connection with the dissertation involves extended field work and hence substantial expenditure not covered by the contingency grant, ad-hoc research grants are awarded depending on merit of the case.

The rates of scholarships are as follows:

Students with M.B.A., M.E., M.Tech., and M.Phil. or B.Tech., B.E., M.A., M.Sc., or M.Stat., with two years work experience are paid Rs.2400/- per month for the first two years and Rs.2500/- per month for the subsequent years.

Students with B.E., B.Tech., M.A., M.Sc., and M.Stat., with less than two years work experience are paid Rs. 1800/- per month for the first two years and then Rs. 2100/- per month for the subsequent years. A student normally gets a maximum of 4 years scholarship and contingency fund. A student can also have an extension for a period of one year at the end of 4 years on the basis of his research ability recommended by the Institute, for completion of the programme.

A.2.(10) Residence

Students are generally required to stay on the Campus for which hostel accommodation is provided. The Institute has no arrangement of housing accommodation for married students with their spouses.

A.2.(11) Placement

Placement facilities are available to all Fellowship students who have successfully completed the Programme requirements.

The Institute encourages Fellow students to take up assignments which offer opportunities for research.

A.2.(12) Course Requirements

A.2.(12)(i) Fellow Programme in Management

<u>First Year</u>: 15 credit courses and a non-credit course, all being compulsory.

<u>Second Year</u>: 7 credit courses in the major area; 5 credit courses in the minor area; and 1 credit course in Management Policy, <u>plus</u> a report on Summer Vacation project/research work which is treated as equivalent to 2 credit courses (total 15 courses).

A.2.(12)(ii) Fellow Programme in Related Disciplines

<u>First Year</u>: 3 compulsory credit courses, namely, Statistics I; Statistics II and Data Processing; 9 credit courses in major area; 3 credit courses in the minor area; and 1 compulsory non-credit course in Basic Mathematics or Statistics.

<u>Second Year</u>: 13 credit courses (of which at least 9 should be from the major area) and a report on Summer Vacation project/research work, which is treated as equivalent to 2 credit courses (total 15 courses).

For those exempted from the first year of course work, the second year requirements are :

Three compulsory credit courses, namely, Statistics I, Statistics II and Data Processing, 9 credit courses in the major area and 3 credit courses in the minor area.

A student from either of the Fellow Programme streams can choose any of the management areas or any one of the related disciplines as his/her major field.

The Programmes have been so designed that all the first year courses as well as minor area courses in the second year are of a post-graduate level. Most of these will be offered to both the Fellow and the Post Graduate Programme students. However, all the second year major area courses will be an advanced doctoral standard.

A.2.(13) Summer Project

Between April and June of the first year, students who are promoted to the second year are provided with two options:

a) To work on a specific management problem in a private or public sector organisation under the guidance of a faculty member. Permission to do this is granted by the Fellow Programme Chairman on the recommedation of his Faculty Adviser. The summer project should be directly related to the student's area of specialisation.

Or

b) To undertake research work relevant to his/her area of specialisation. This should be done in consultation with the Faculty Adviser and the student must inform the Fellowship Chairman accordingly.

Subsequent summer terms are to be devoted to the student's own research work.

A.2.(14) System of Evaluation

Students' performance in course is graded on a 9-point scale as follows:

A+ = 9 A = 8 A- = 7 B+ = 6 B = 5 B- = 4 C+ = 3 F = Fail.

A minimum of B- is required for passing a credit course and a minimum of C+ in a non-credit course.

Minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) standards required of every FP student for getting promotion to 2nd year is 5.00/9.00 at the end of the Third Term.

The maximum number of failures allowed in anyone term would be two and of them at least one must be in a non-credit course. No permanent failures are allowed in the 2nd year. Further, no permanent failures are allowed in a specialised course. A student not maintaining these standards would be required to withdraw from the Programme.

A.2.(15) The Comprehensive Qualifying Examination

The Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (CQE) consists of a written examination in two parts covering the candidate's major and minor areas and is followed by an oral examination. If any student leaves the Institute before completing the CQE and Thesis proposal defence, he/she will not be allowed to continue in the Programme.

A.2.(16) Evaluation of Thesis Proposal

On successful completion of the Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (both written and oral) the students are allowed to start work on their thesis. The thesis proposal will have to be evaluated and approved by the student's **Thesis Advisory Committee** which will forward its recommendation to the Fellow Programme Committee.

A.2.(17) Thesis Examination Committee

The thesis is to be evaluated by the members of a Thesis Examination Committee consisting of two internal and two external examiners.

Unanimous acceptance of the thesis by 4 thesis examiners is required. If the thesis is rejected by more than one examiner, then the thesis has to be resubmitted. If the thesis is rejected by only one examiner, then the opinion of a fifth examiner will be sought whose decision will be final.

The student can resubmit his thesis only once. After unanimous acceptance of 4 examiners through comprehensive reports, there will be a public defence of the thesis in the presence of the Thesis Examination Committee and other faculty members and interested persons. Persons outside the Thesis Examination Committee can ask questions but not evaluate the thesis.

Two students who completed all the requirements were awarded the title "Fellow of IIMC" in the Annual Convocation of the Institute held on 12.3.1994.

A.3. POST-GRADUATE CERTIFICATE COURSE IN GENERAL MANAGEMENT (PGCGM)

Responding to the ever increasing demand for a well-designed comprehensive programme in Management from practicing managers in the city of Calcutta and around, IIMC started a Two-Year Evening Programme leading to the Post-Graduate Certificate in General Management in 1981. Classes are held thrice a week on alternate days from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Institute's City Office at 8, Ho-Chi-Minh Sarani, Calcutta - 700 071. It is a non-residential course.

In designing and implementing this Programme, attempts have been made to combine the experience based strength of the participants with the conceptual rigour of inputs drawn from a comprehensive set of management disciplines. The focus has consistently been to develop such knowledge, skills and perspectives which will enable these candidates to become

effective managers and be prepared to assume higher responsibilities. Based on the experience in conducting this course, the project work has been made more rigorous and allowed for a greater flexibility for the participant to plan his courses given the typical constraints he faces as a working executive.

59 students were admitted in June'93 in the first year of the course (13th Batch 1993-95). Due to withdrawals on account of inability to maintain 60% attendance and for personal reasons, the number stood at 42 at the end of the year. There were also 42 students who were in the second year of the course [35 belonging to the 12th Batch (1992-94); 6 belonging to the 11th Batch (1991-93); and 1 belonging to the 10th Batch (1990-92)]. 40 students in the second year were awarded "Post Graduate Certificate in General Management" in the Convocation held on 12.3.94.

For selection of the 13th Batch (1993-95) of PGCGM students, 159 applications were received; 96 persons were called for interview and 60 offers were sent and 59 were admitted.

There is a proposal to upgrade the 2-year Evening Programme (7 Terms) to 3-year Evening Programme (10 Terms) and to get recognition to it as equivalent to MBA, which proposal is under reference to the All India Council for Technical Educa-tion for approval. It is expected that with AICTE's approval, the upgraded programme could be started from the next academic session commencing from June 1994. The 2-year Programme for the 14th Batch (1994-96), which incidentally would be the last batch after introduction of the upgraded programme, would also be run simultaneously with the upgraded programme from the next academic session commencing from June'94, if there are students opting for this (PGCGM) programme. From 1995 onwards there would not be any more recruitment for the PGCGM Programme.

A.3.(1) Programme Curriculum

In all, twentyone courses and a project (equivalent to one course load) based on a problem pertaining to the organisation in which the candidate is working, comprise the curriculum. The area in which the work is intended to be done in the proposal for the project would require the approval of the faculty. The termwise break-up of courses offered is given below:

- Term I
- 1. Mathematics for Management
- 2. Principles of Economics
- 3. Organizational Behaviour
- Term II
- 1. Statistics for Management
- 2. Economic Development
- 3. Organizational Structure and Administration
- Term III
- 1. Operations Research
- 2. Marketing Management
- 3. Financial and Cost Accounting

- Term IV 1. Production Management
 - 2. Marketing Research
 - 3. Data Processing
- Term V 1. Finance
 - 1. Financial Management
 - 2. Indian Social Structure
 - 3. Evolution of the Indian Corporate Sector
- Term VI 1. Personnel Management and Industrial Relations
 - 2. Management Information Systems
 - 3. Management Policy
- Term VII 1. Development Management
 - 2. Indian Legal System
 - 3. Management Game

The candidates are normally required to take all the courses offered in the sequence as outlined above. However, they have the option of spreading these over a period not exceeding three years subject to the condition that such option may be exercised only after completion of the first three terms and with prior approval.

A.3.(2) Eligibility for Admission

The candidates for admission to the Programme should satisfy the following criteria:

- (i) the applicant must hold at least a Bachelor's degree in any discipline or a professional qualification recognised as equivalent to a Bachelor's degree by the Department of Education, Government of India, with minimum 50% aggregate marks;
- (ii) minimum 50% aggregate marks either in Secondary or Higher Secondary standard examination held by a Board/University;
- (iii) the applicant should be employed at the time of applying for admission to the programme; and
- (iv) the applicant should have held Executive/Supervisory position in Business/ Industry/Government for a minimum period of two years after graduation.

The eligible candidates are required to appear at the Common Admission Test (CAT) and are selected for the Programme based on the following factors:

- (i) Performance in the CAT;
- (ii) Previous academic record of the candidate;

- (iii) Work experience; and
- (iv) Aptitude, ability and interest to pursue management studies as revealed in the interview.

A.3.(3) <u>Fees</u>

A fee of Rs.1,400/- per term per participant is charged.

A.3.(4) <u>Pedagogy</u>

Learning is considered as a two way process. Most courses require a high degree of participation and in some courses, participants will play an effective role in course design and development. Besides lectures, cases based on live problems, management games and project work will form the vital components of the pedagogy.

A.3.(5) Extension Programmes

Extension Programmes generally aim at imparting basic managerial concepts and skills with a view to improving the participants' effectiveness in their functional areas.

A.3(6) Alumni Association

The ex-students body have formed a PGCGM Alumni Association.

B. TRAINING PROGRAMMES

An important objective of the Institute is to provide practicing managers and administrators at different levels in industry and government an opportunity to equip themselves with knowledge in the field of management, to improve the problem-

solving ability and to develop their decision-making skills and managerial competence. The Institute, therefore, conducts a wide variety of training programmes which include executive and

management development programmes, workshops, seminars and conferences as well as programmes sponsored by various Departments and Agencies of the Central and State Governments, local governing bodies and organizations both in the public sector and in the private sector. All these training programmes can be classified broadly into two categories:

- I. Management Development Programmes (MDPs), [called earlier as Executive Development Programmes (EDPs)] are initiated by the Institute itself and offered to practicing managers and administrators on intercompany basis as a means for continuing education in the field of management. MDPs are not designed for a specific organization per se; they are, by and large, given a somewhat broad focus so that executives from more than one organization can participate meaningfully in such programmes. A few of these programmes are offered in collaboration with other organizations such as professional societies and government agencies.
- II. Sponsored Training Programmes, which are organized by the Institute in response to request from client organizations to conduct such programmes. Most of these programmes are designed specifically to suit the training requirements of individual organizations.

B.1 Management Development Programme

During the year under review 25 Programmes were held with a total number of 457 participants. A list of the Programmes held is shown in (Annexure-XV)

B.3 Training Programmes Sponsored by Government

C. RESEARCH

C.1 Centre for Management and Development Studies

The Centre for Management and Development Studies (CMDS) plays a coordinating role in the promotion of research activities at the Institute. Apart from sponsoring research projects, the CMDS also finances seminars, workshops and can provide seed-money for externally sponsored/funded research projects channelled through the Institute.

C.2 During 1993-94, the research projects undertaken by the members of faculty and research staff under CMDS are given in Annexure-XVIII which indicates also Research Projects completed and those sanctioned during the year.

D. ACTIVITY CENTRES

D.1. Programme in Rural Development Management

- D.1.(1) The main objective of this Centre is to examine the relevance and applicability of management concepts and sytems to the rural sector with a dual purpose of improving managerial practices and acquiring greater understanding of the working of rural organisations.
- D.1.(2) Details of the Research/Consultancy Projects undertaken and course materials prepared by the Centre and other activities of the Centre during the year are given below:

D.2. Centre for Studies in Public Enterprise Management (CSPEM)

D.2.(1) The Board of Governors of this Institute has identified public enterprise as a key research area. To promote research and training in this key area of national importance a Centre for Studies in Public Enterprise Management has been set up at the Institute.

The Centre is playing a major role in helping the Government shape its current policy towards public enterprises. It is working actively with the Department of Public Enterprises in designing and implementing Government's policy on MOU between Public Enterprises and the Government. The major objective of this work is to ultimately improve the efficiency of the Indian Public Sector. By most accounts, the Centre has made a great deal of progress towards this goal.

- **D.2.(2)** The Centre has engaged itself in the following activities during the year 1992-93:
 - I. Consultancy Projects:

"The Corporate Planning for Coal India" project was completed.

- II. Research Project:
- i) Internalization of MOUs on-going.
- ii) MBA students bias against Public Sector (Pilot study has been completed).
- iii)Post privatisation experience in British Industries.

D.3. Centre for Project Management

- D.3(1) The Centre for Project Management has been set up to carry out research and conduct training programme in the area of project management with a focus on the following themes:
 - * Issues related to project implementation in India
 - * Long-term and short-term guidelines on the policy as well as procedures to be adopted for effective implementation of projects from conception to comissioning.
- **D.3(2)** A number of training programmes were conducted on project management. An Elective course in project management was offered in the Post Graduate Programme.

D.4. Centre for Studies & Research in Environment Management

- D.4(1) IIMC has taken intiatives to set up a Centre for Studies & Research in Environment management. The objectives of this Centre is to address the important global and the national concern for integrating critical environmental dimentions in management of development as well as all consolidate over time academic, research and training efforts in this realm.
- **D.4(2)** Activities already being conducted include elective course on Environment Management in the Post Graduate Programme and, several training programmes on critical issues in environmental protection, control and assessment.
- **D.4(3)** Besides, a major long-term collaborative effort with the Environment & Forest Dept of West Bangal and, OECF of Japan is being finalised for training of manpower n environment management in the state. An International Conference on Environment & Health in Developing Countries is being organised in December 1994.

D.5. Management Centre for Human Values.

The Management Centre for Human Values' (MCHV), which aims to enriching ethical and human values consciousness utilizing classical pcycho-philosophical concepts and methods, is being constructed within the campus with generous donations from a large number of organizations. They range from Rs.5 to Rs.25 lacs offered by Coal India, Bhilwara, UTI, IOC, IPCL, Godrej and Boyce, Greaves Cotton and so on. The total cost is estimated to be Rs.3.50 crores -- Rs.1.50 crores capital cost and Rs.2.00 crores corpus fund. The MCHV has three Research Fellows (supported by industry) and one Professor. Plans to publish an international Journal of Human Values from 1995 have been completed. Members of the MCHV offer every year nearly 30 in-house Workshops throughout India. Two annual Workshops are also conducted at IIM-C campus, with some international participants also. An Alumni Association of past participants in these Workshops has been formed. The Association is publishing a quarterly MCHV Newsletter. Three books in the field of human values are in different stages of publication. A comprehensive all-India survey research on value orientation is now on.

E. CONSULTANCY

- E.1. Besides the on-going consultancy assignments undertaken for public and private sector organizations, a number of new consultancy assignments were taken up by the Institute on behalf of different organizations both in the public as well as in the private sector. The demand for the Institute's consultancy services has been increasing. Consultancy requests are also coming from non-conventional sectors.
- **E.2.** A list of consultancy assignments completed/on-going during the year is shown in Annexure-XIX.

F. PUBLICATIONS

JOURNAL

Four issues of the journal, **DECISION** (Vol. 19, Nos. 3 and 4 combined, Vol. 20, Nos. 1, 2 and 3) were published.

WORKING PAPERS

During the year, Publications Division brought out 21 Working Papers authored by the members of Faculty/Research Staff. With the streamlining of the pro-duction and distribution of Working Papers, the Publications Division is able to issue an increasing number of Working Papers. The Division have also been maintaining the programme of exchanging Working Papers with other reputed Institutes/Universities. Apart from internal distribution, the Working Papers are now being sent to about 100 Institutes/Universities in India and abroad.

BOOKS

The Publication Division has negotiated with Oxford University Press for publishing a book titled "Probability and its Applications" jointly edited by Professor Manish C. Bhattacharjee & Professor Sujit K. Basu. The book is awaiting publication.

The Publication Division also assists faculty members/Centres in their publication work. During the year under review, the Publications Division brought out the Bibliography on Management of Rural Development (Vol. IV). The next volumes of this Bibliography (Vol. V and VI) and the Directory of Management on Rural Development (Vol. V) edited by Professor Madhu S. Mishra are in the pipeline.

Publication by Faculty and Research Staff of the Institute during 1993-94 are given in Annexure-XXII.

4. ANNUAL CONVOCATION

The Twentyninth Annual Convocation of the Institute was held on the 12th March, 1994. The Chief Guest was Shri Pranab Mukherjee, Union Commerce Minister and Deputy Chairman, Planning Commission, Shri D. Bandyopadhyay, Chairman of the Board of Governors of IIMC, presided over the function.

In this convocation, 181 students of the Post Graduate Programme were awarded the Post Graduate Diploma. There were 170 boys and 11 girls among the graduating students. A list of such students is given in Annexure-XXIII. Two Fellow students of the Institute were awarded the title "Fellow of IIMC".

Information about the students who got Fellowship award in the convocation, along with his dissertation title, is given in Annexure-XXIV.

Post Graduate Certificate in General Management was also awarded to 40 students (33 of the 12th Batch - 1992-94; 6 of the 11th Batch - 1991-93 and 1 of the 10th Batch - 1990-92) in this Convocation. Details are given in Annexure-XXV.

5. COMPUTER CENTRE

- 5.1. The Institute took over the Computer Aided Management (CAM) Centre, which was financed by the Department of Electronics, with assistance from UNDP, on 1.4.91. Computer resources available in this Centre and those available in the Institute outside this Centre have all been brought together and the combined resources are available for the students and the faculty for their studies and work. - 5.2 Besides the Computer Centre Committee which is headed by a Chairman (a faculty of the Institute), there are highly specialised and experienced professionals [Senior Systems Analyst (one) and Systems Analyst (two)] to look after the activities of the Centre. They are assisted by trained technical personnel [Programmer (one) and Data Processing Assistants (six)].
- 5.3 The Centre organised two computer awareness programme on PC packages, running over a twelve week period, for IIM Calcutta Staff Members.

- The Computer resources are put to extensive use by the students and the faculty (for their teaching courses and the training programmes). The computing and technical manpower resources of the Centre were extensively used in the intensive course on "Computer Based Information Systems" (7 weeks), which was held during April 24 June 19, 1993, attended by fortyeight executives.
- 5.5 The Centre is assisting the Institute Library and the Accounts to computerise its operations.
- 5.6 The Centre has a class equipped with an Overhead Projector and PC Projector.
- 5.7 IIMC is the first academic Institute in the country which has got a full fledged Computer Centre in the Students Hostels. The entire installation is run and managed by the students themselves.
- 5.8 E-Mail service has been started from March, 1994 which has enabled the Institute to have access to all places across the globe.

8. LIBRARY

B.C. Roy Memorial Library, the learning resource centre of the Institute, was developed initially with a liberal Ford Grant and has grown through the last three decades into a management Library in South Asia.

Besides its collection of 122000 volumes of books and Bound Serials and a fairly large population of reports, microforms and AV materials, the Library hold over 600 current journals and some massive optical/electronic databases. During the year 1204 books and 476 volumes of bound Journals have been added to its stock.

Database:

Apart from ABI/INFORM CD-ROM database, this year, the Library is installing a workstation equipped with Multi-user CD-ROM access supports. Acquisition of electronic databases a) PREDICAST FS Index plus text and b) Social Science Citation Index is in progress.

Projects:

A team of Library professionals of the Institute under the leadership of Shri P.S. Guha, Deputy Librarian, completed the Project of "Union Catalogue of Serials on Management".

Staff Development:

Smt. Papiya Chakraborty is undergoing Master in Library Science Course at Jadavpur University, on study leave.

As a participant of CALIBNET - the first bibliographic network in the country - the Library is being geared to access external databases on line.

Membership Extension:

The Library being an integrated part of the national resource of information extends its membership to the external scholars and business and industrial houses.

9. CAMPUS DEVELOPMENT

- Three major construction works which were in hand, viz. 170-bedded 3rd Students' 9.1 Hostel, a 4-storied New Teaching Block having a capacity to accommodate 46 Nos. of faculty members, 23 Nos. of Stenographers and containing 4 Nos. big and 7 Nos. Small Conference Rooms and Group 'D' Staff Quarters containing 48 flats, were completed in all respects during the year. After completing the pile foundation work for the 10 storied Faculty Quarters, work on the superstructure was started. This work is in full swing. The building upto 5th floor which has been taken up in the first phase is expected to be completed by May, 1995. The foundation work of the building to acommodate the Management Centre for Human Values(MCHU), which will be financed with funds collected by way of donations from Public and Private Organisations. is in progress. The construction of a big hall measuring 89' x 28' over the front portion of the Ground Floor of the MDP Hostel, with provision for sound proof folding partition in the hall and air cooling arrangement with split-type air-conditioners has been completed. Similarly, the addition of a floor over the existing 2-floors in 'F' and 'C' type Staff Quarters was completed and the additional flats so constructed, allotted to the employees. The work for renovation and modernisation of the facilities available at the Management Development Centre (Tata Hall) has been taken in hand and is being executed without dislocating the day to day activities in the Centre. The work is expected to be completed by September 1994.
- 9.2 The Calcutta Telephones have been given 10,000 sq.ft. of land inside the Campus for the establishment of an Electronic Exchange, with a microwave tower. They have taken up the construction of the building, which is in progress.
- 9.3 The Engineering Division also attended to work relating to repairs and maintenance of buildings, water mains and electrical installation (including air conditioning and refrigeration equipment) inside the campus and maintenance of the city hired flats and the city office at Harrington Mansion.

Terms of Reference

i) To review the present status of the IIMs in fulfillment of their objectives as Centres of excellence in management education and research.

- ii) To assess the overall impact of the Institutes on the Training of high level management personnel for the development of the country.
- iii) To make recommendations regarding reorganisation of IIMs with a view to better serving the country's economic and social development needs.
- iv) To suggest measures for making the Institutes more cost effective and less dependent on government grants.
- v) To review the management structure of the IIMs and to suggest necessary changes therein and other measures for realising the recommendations of the Committee.

- vi) To report on any other aspects that are relevant to overall effective and efficient functioning of these Institutes.
- 2. The Committee submitted its report to the Govt. of India in the Ministry of HRD in July'92. The Ministry set up on 25.9.92 an Empowered Committee under the Chairmanship of the Secretary, Department of Education to consider the various recommendations made by the Review Committee and to decide the modalities and actions to be taken for implementation of the recommendations. The recommendations of the Empowered Committee as approved by the Minister of Human Resources Development had been received from the Ministry in February'94 and are under implementation.

19. FUTURE PLAN

- 1.1. Keeping in view the changes taking place in the international arena and the gradual opening up of the Indian Economy to global competition, to improve India's international competitiveness, IIM Calcutta has lauched special programmes to suitably modify its courses to focus on international trends and issues. Our PGDM curriculum includes, among others, International Economics; International Finance; Money and Capital Markets; Information Technology for Strategic Objectives; Inter-national Marketing; Strategic Marketing; Technology Management; Quality Management; Labour, Unions and Structural Adjustments; Environment Management; Industry and Rural Society; International Management; Mergers & Acquisitions; Competitivenes; Manufacturing Strategy and Cost Analysis; and Diversification and Financial Strategy. Similarly, stress is laid on globalisation/liberalisation issues in the Training Programmes conducted; Seminars, Conferences and Workshops organised; Books and Institute's Working Paper Series brought out by the faculty etc. To help the students to get international exposure, the Institute sponsored participation by 2 students of the Institute in the International Business School Meet held during March 3-8, 1994 at McGill Business School, Montreal, Canada.
- 1.2. Efforts would continue to be made to upgrade further the quality of the Institute's core programmes (Teaching, Research, Training and Consultancy) to help to face the challenges arising out of the liberalisation/globalisation of the Indian Economy.
- 1.3. Dr. Manas Chatterjee, Professor in the School of Management, University of Bingampton, New York, USA, has been appointed as an Hony. Distinguished Visiting Professor in the Regional Development Group of the Institute for a period of 5 years from 1994. No remuneration would be paid to him, but as and when he comes and stays in the campus, Institute would provide him with local hospitality. With his worldwide connections with Universities, Research Institutions, Government Organisa-tions etc., he would, in the context of the current trend towards globalisation, help us in our activities to be a global player. He would help us in organising International Conferences, offer Research Seminars for the Institute Faculty Members, address the students in colloquia meets and participate in the senior level specialised MDPs. At present he is collaborating with the Institute in organising an International Conference on Environment & Health in the Developing Countries at the Campus during December 15-18,

- 1994. It is proposed to offer Hony. Distinguished Professorship of the Institute to more such renowned NRIs holding very high positions in well known academic institutions abroad and also Hony. Distinguished Fellows of the Institute to NRIs who have been highly successful in the Business World abroad.
- 2.1. The Institute is one of the participants in the Euro-India Cooperation and Exchange Programme (EICEP) to forge closer links with the Management Schools in Europe including joint research and case studies. During the year, one faculty member was deputed under this Programme for an assignment with the Manchester Business School, U.K., for a period of about 6 months from January 1994.
- 2.2. The Institute has a colloboration arrangement with the College of Management, Henley on Thames, U.K., which is funded by the British Council. Under this, one faculty member visited Henley for 3 months during May-July 1993.
- 2.3. The Institute also has an Exchange Programme with the Stockholm University, Sweden.
- 3.1. The Institute's Computer Centre has emerged as one of the leading Centres in the area of Computer application. IIM Calcutta students are already playing a leading role in the country's march towards adoption of information technology to tackle different kinds of managerial problems.
- 3.2. A new two-year full time residential Post Graduate Programme in Computer Aided Management (PGDCM), integrating Management and Computer Science is proposed to be started from the next academic year commencing from June 1994. Approval of the AICTE has been sought.
- 4. The two-year evening Post Graduate Certificate Programme in General Management (PGCGM) is proposed to be restructured under which course content would get changed and the duration of the programme would get extended by one year (i.e. from 2 years to 3 years). It awaits the approval of the All India Council for Technical Education for granting recognition to it as MBA equivalent. It is hoped to start the restructured programme, with AICTE's approval, from the next Academic Year commencing from June 1994.
- 5. The Institute has been doing pioneering work in the area of Management of Human Values for the past about 2 decades. The aim is to develop Indian Ethos in Management, linking values with our cultural heritage. A Management Centre for Human Values is in operation with Prof. S.K. Chakraborty as Coordinator and 3 Research Fellows, 2 financed by ACC and one financed by Chloride. A separate building in the Campus to accommodate the Centre is under construction with donations from Public and Private Sector organisations. The amount of donations received upto the end of the year was Rs.96.75 lakhs and more funds are being received.

- 6. The Centre for Public Enterprises Management in the Institute is proposed to be strengthened with assistance from the Government of India to conduct Studies of Restructuring and enhancement of efficiency of Public Enterprises and Public Systems.
- 7. The Institute has been selected by UNIDO as a Centre in South Asia to train entrepreneurs, managers and Govt. officials in the area of Management for Entrepreneurs.
- 8. There is a proposal for the establishment of a National Centre for Research in Materials Management in the Campus, as a joint venture of IIMC and the Indian Institute of Materials Management (IIMM). IIMC would provide land for the Centre in the Campus, while IIMM would provide the funding to meet capital as well as operating costs.
- 9. The Govt. of India in the Department of Economic Affairs, Government of West Bengal and the Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund (OECF) of Japan have agreed to include IIM Calcutta by name as a Nodal Centre in the OECF initiative for training personnel of the West Bengal Pollution Control Board and of the State Industrial Sector for building up a cadre of trained personnel for proper management of industrial pollution and waste hazards in the West Bengal State on a sustained basis. For this purpose, a Centre for Studies and Training in Environmental Management is proposed to be established in the Institute. A scheme in this regard has been drawn up and submitted to OECF, Japan, for financial support for the construction of a permanent building and facilities for the Centre in the Campus and for meeting the recurring costs for the conduct of the Centre's activities.
- 10. The Institute proposes to hold an International Conference on "Environment and Health in Developing Countries" at the Campus during December 15-16, 1994 in collaboration with Prof. Manas Chatterjee, School of Management, Binghampton University, New York. It is expected that 50 International delegates and 100-150 Indian delegates would participate in this event.
- 11. The Institute continues to play a major role in assisting Indian Industry, banks, financial institutions and public organisations through studies and consultancies.
- 12. The Govt. of India have introduced a revised pattern of funding, among others, for this Institute, under which the Govt., apart from providing 10% extra grant each year under "Non Plan" upto 31.3.97, over and above the grant given in 1992-93, would provide assistance in building up an "Endowment Fund" by way of additional grant matching with the savings effected by the Institute each year and credited to that fund. Under this arrangement, the Institute would enjoy greater autonomy in its administration.
