1. THE INSTITUTE

The Indian Institute of Management Calcutta (IIMC) was the first national Institute established by the Government of India in 1961 to spearhead professional management in Indian industry, business and government. Cooperating with the Government of India in this effort were the Alfred P. Sloan School of Management of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the Government of West Bengal, the Ford Foundation and the business community. It now forms an integral part of the Government of India's efforts to promote professional management in India. IIMC moved into its 36th year on November 14, 1996. During this period it has grown from strength to strength and is today playing a major role in the task of improving management practices in India. More than 3570 alumni are in position of strategic importance in industry today - in India as well as abroad. In addition, a large number of senior managers from Indian industry and Government have had the benefit of interaction with IIMC through its Executive Development Programmes, Extension Programmes and Consultancy assignments. The Institute attaches great importance to research which is devoted to problems of management and those of development. Indeed, management of development is a major focus of the Institute's range of activities.

One more year of fruitful activities has been completed. The Institute continued to focus its research and training activities on Public Enterprises, Project Management, Environment Management and Rural Development for which separate activity centres exist. Another area in which the Institute has been working and will continue its endeavour with greater emphasis is in the use of computers for solving management problems. As a major effort in this direction, it started a 2-year fully residential post graduate programme combining information technology and management, leading to the issue of Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Aided Management (PGDCM), equivalent to MBA. Information on the different activities of the Institute and the efforts it has continued to make to ensure the maintenance of high standards of performance are provided in this report.

2. SOCIETY AND THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Institute was constituted on November 14, 1961, as a Society under the Societies' Registration Act. It is administered by the Board of Governors. The Chairman of the Board is appointed by the Government of India in consultation with the Government of West Bengal. Other members of the Board include nominees of the Central and the State Governments, representatives from constituencies like education, commerce, industry, labour and other interests. The Director of the Institute and two nominees of the Institute's Faculty are also members of the Board of Governors. A part of the annual recurring and almost full non-recurring expenses of the Institute are provided by the Government of India.

A list of the members of the Society and the Board of Governors (as on March 31, 1997) is given in Annexure-1.

3. OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTE

The objectives of the Institute are:

- * To direct the education and development of young men and women along specific lines so as to match the management needs of industrial and other types of organizations.
- * To establish an infrastructure which would provide practicing managers with the opportunity to acquaint themselves with management concepts, techniques and research.
- * To establish a rapport between management scientists and industrial decision-makers through consultancy and training programmes aimed at facilitating problem solving in organization.
- * To build a Centre of Advanced Management providing opportunities for innovative research and promoting the development of indigenous literature on management.

Since its establishment, the Institute has been channelizing all efforts and resources to accomplish its objectives.

A.1. POST GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN MANAGEMENT

The two-year Post Graduate Programme in Management is a full-time residential course for graduates from all disciplines. The 33rd session of the Programme began in July 1996.

The Post Graduate Programme (PGP) of the Institute is designed for students desiring to embark upon careers in management, who are willing and able to devote two complete academic years in pursuing studies in management education. Students from all over India continue to be attracted to the Programme. It is the core activity of the Institute designed to meet the challenges of rapid changes in our society. The students are continually encouraged to deal with unstructured situations and evolve solutions to complex problems. The main thrust is to imbibe a sense of strategic outlook to management problems in the students; to develop in them a global view of economic, technological, cultural and political environment of the business; to help them to acquire ability to face uncertainties and challenges of a global economy with great amount of flexibility. To provide a basis for this approach to learning, the First Year of the Programme is devoted to developing a working knowledge of Economic Principles, Principles of Organisation and Behaviour, Financial and Accounting Systems and Quantitative Methods for solution of management problems.

The academic year at the Institute is divided into three terms each consisting of about twelve working weeks. The Programme requires six terms of full-time work. Due to the nature of the learning process which requires a full-time involvement rather than just the attendance in classes, the Programme is entirely residential. The students are continuously graded, not only on their performance in the examinations but also on class participation, home assignments, projects, presentations, etc. In the First Year, all the courses are compulsory. In the Second Year, the students are allowed a choice of 13 electives over three terms along with three compulsory courses. In the summer, between the First and the Second Year, the students are expected to gain practical experience through related employment. Apart from helping the students to supplement their academic knowledge through practical exposure, this aids them in their selection of Second Year electives.

The Institute's faculty use different pedagogical tools to facilitate learning. The Institute believes that the method of instruction for maximising learning varies from course to course and so uses varying proportions of the case study methods, lectures, group exercises and project work.

The students after completing the Diploma at the Institute have fairly exciting careers ahead. The period covering the next few years in our country will see rapid changes and the Institute's educational programme should take these into account in its courses. The teaching programmes of the Institute are, therefore, designed to help the students to develop a base from which they continue to learn. The programme stresses conceptual and analytical reasoning while providing students with the knowledge of the current state of business and the decision models used by managers today.

More than 3570 young managers have graduated from the Institute and are today occupying important positions.

A.1(1) Admission

Students are admitted to the Post-Graduate Programme on the basis of their interests, aptitude and capacity for undergoing a rigorous programme of study in management sciences, as indicated by previous academic records, scores in the admission test, performance in group discussions and interview, and also work experience.

The minimum eligibility criterion is a Bachelor's Degree (in 10+2+3 systems) recognised by the Association of Indian Universities as eligible for Post Graduate studies or equivalent, with 50% aggregate marks (45% marks for SC/ST candidates) and minimum 50% aggregate marks (45% for SC/ST candidates) in anyone of the secondary/Higher Secondary Examination (or equivalent) held by any Board/University.

One of the methods of judging the fitness of a candidate to the programme is the Common Admission Test (CAT) administered jointly by Indian Institutes of Management at Ahmedabad, Bangalore, Calcutta and Lucknow.

A.1(2) 33rd Post Graduate Programme (1996-98)

Based on the performance in the Common Admission Test, candidates were called for personal interviews and group discussions by a panel consisting of faculty members of the Institute, experts from Industry and Government and Alumni at 4 metropolitan cities of the country, namely, Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Chennai. The students were selected on the basis of performance in the interviews also. Annexure II gives information about the number interviewed and the number offered during the last 10 years.

A.1(3) Educational background of the 33rd Batch of Students

A study of the educational background of the students of the 33rd Session (1996-98), vide Annexure IV, reveals that 77% belonged to engineering stream and 23% belonged to non-engineering stream.

A.1(4) Reservation for SC/ST candidates

22.5% seats of the Post Graduate Programme are reserved for candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes/Tribes community and same relaxation in entry standard was extended to them as in the earlier years.

A.1(5) 34th Session of Post Graduate Programme (1997-99)

The Common Admission Test (CAT) for selecting students for the 34th session of the Post Graduate Programme (1997-99) commencing in June, 1997 was held on December 8, 1996, all over India, in 20 Centres.

The 7 examination centres at Bhubaneswar, Calcutta, Guwahati, Hyderabad, Jamshedpur, Nagpur and Patna were under the control of IIMC.

The CAT (Written Test) was common for IIM Ahmedabad; IIM Bangalore; IIM Calcutta and IIM Lucknow.

The Institute received and processed 9936 CAT applications from the candidates appearing for the CAT at the aforesaid 7 centres. 9225 candidates appeared for the test at these centres.

The total number of candidates appeared at all the 20 centres in the country were 35135, out of whom 31821 candidates had applied for PGDM in IIM Calcutta. 901 candidates (716 General; 120 SC; and 65 ST) were shortlisted for Interview and Group Discussion, vide Annexure III. 430 offers were made out of which 251 finally accepted and joined.

A.1(6) Curriculum

For the Post Graduate Programme, the principal fields of study include Economics, Statistics, Operations Research, Behavioural Sciences, Sociology, History and Law, Economic, Social and Political Environment of Enterprises, Applied fields of Marketing, Production, Finance, Personnel Management, Labour Relations, Materials Management, Management Information Systems, Management Policy, Organizational Communication and Decision Making, Managerial Accounting and Control and Regional Development. Courses are arranged on the basis of minimum of 30 contact hours spread over a quarter. The first year courses covered by Terms I to III are compulsory for all the students. During the second year, Indian Legal System (Term IV), Management Policy (Term V) and Management Games (Term VI) are also compulsory courses for all the students. In addition, the students are required to work on a project during the summer between the first and the second year of study. Summer Projects are meant for those students who have completed the First Year of the Post-Graduate Programme successfully. Each student is required, as a compulsory part of the curriculum, to spend about eight weeks of the period May-June working on a project specified by an employer and to submit a report to the sponsoring authority. The students work under the guidance of a faculty member who finally evaluates the project report. The summer project is assigned a weightage equivalent to that of one course in the curriculum. A list of Organizations where the Post-Graduate Programme students worked for their Summer Projects in May-June 1996 is given in Annexure-V.

The Institute does not offer any specialisation package. However, it is possible for the students to choose optional courses with concentration in areas of their choice in their second year, keeping in view the current requirements for specialisation/concentration for placement purposes. Students however are not allowed to take more than 6 optional courses in any one area of specialisation (out of 13 to be opted for). As already indicated above, the courses, Strategic Management, Indian Legal System and Management Games, are compulsory for the second year students. The list of Optional Courses offered in the Post Graduate Programme is shown in Annexure-VI.

As in previous years, this year also, a number of senior practicing managers were invited to supplement the efforts of the Institute faculty, as visiting faculty, to expose the students to real life problems.

A.1(7) Colloquia Series

The series was immensely successful in achieving its objectives. In the year 1996-97, a large number of leading professionals from industry and corporate circles shared their views and experiences with the students and the faculty members of IIMC on a wide range of topics in management.

A.1(10) System of Evaluation

Students are evaluated on the basis of examinations, reports, take home assignments, term papers, class performance, seminars, regular tests, surprise quizzes and oral examinations as determined by the faculty members concerned. Sometimes, in courses involving group methods of teaching, students play a major role in grading each other.

A.1(11) The Passing Standard and the Diploma

Marks under the grade-point system are used in evaluating a student's performance in each term and in the two-year Programme as a whole. To graduate, a student must obtain an average of at least 5.0 in all courses, taken on credit in the Post-Graduate Programme. Generally, in order to be promoted to the Second Year, a student should obtain an average of at least 4.5 at the end of the Third Term. A student who achieves an average of less than 4.5 at the end of the third term may sometimes be permitted to continue, subject to satisfactory fulfilment of conditions stipulated by the Faculty according to the merits of the case. However, a student once admitted must fulfil all requirements for the Diploma within three academic years.

Those who successfully complete the Programme are awarded the Post-Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM), which has been recognised as equivalent to a Master's Degree in Business Administration by the Ministry of Education, Government of India, the Association of Indian Universities (formerly the Inter-University Board of India and Ceylon) and foreign Universities who have admitted our students into their doctoral programmes.

A.1(12) Student's Participation

IIMC has been in the forefront in allowing students' participation in activities which are student related. Elected student representatives sit on the PGP Committee, Fellow Programme Committee, Placement Committee, Library Committee etc. along with faculty and administration and help to decide on vital policy matters.

Every student is a member of the Students' Association, which has a President, General Secretary and Treasurer. Students themselves, through their elected representaives, organise Mess, Sports, Colloquia, Debates and Quizzes, Music and other social activities.

A.1(13) Placement

The Permanent Placement 1997 was highly successful as in the previous years. The salient features of the Placement are as follows:

- i) 187 students were placed this year for whom we received 208 offers. There were thus 21 job losses.
- ii) A larger number of companies were invited to share their requirement of jobs through the Pre-Placement Talks which started in the month of October'96. However, finally, 80 organisations participated in the week of the actual interview in the campus in Feb.'97 and, of them, 57 companies could have the chance to recruit the students. The sector-wise break up showed that there were 28 Multinational Companies, 24 Private Sector and 5 Public Sector Companies. The details of the students placed, organisationwise, are given in Annexure XII.
- iii) A lot of new companies participated in the Placement process viz. A. T. Kearney (consultancy); Credit Suisse First Boston; GE Capital (Financial Institutions); Whirlpool (Consumer Durables); Birla Management Services, etc. Details of such companies are given in Annexure XI.
- iv) The process of ranking of companies by the students, which is taken into account for the purpose of allotment of days for final interviews was totally computerised, using an in house developed software package.
- v) Marketing function attracted the maximum number of students (70), followed by Finance & Banking (54), Systems (29), Consultancy (18). Several leading Consultancy firms participated and they were favourites with the students both in terms of ranking and job preference. Details are given in Annexure XIV.

- As in last year, this year also, Ramco Systems made the highest number of offers (18). This is followed by Maruti Udyog Ltd (14); Citibank (14); Arvind Mills/Anagram Finance (10); HCL Corporation (10); UTI (7); Asian Paints (6); Unilever Group (6); CRISIL(6); Mckinsey & Co. (5); Hongkong Bank (5); Times Bank (5); California Software (5); Arthur Andersen (4).
- vii) The average salary this showed an increase of 31.75% over the last year. The maximum salary has gone up to Rs 7,23,000 (from Rs. 6,50,000 for PGDM and Rs 6,00,000/- for PGDCM in 1996) and the minimum salary too is higher at Rs 1,20,000/- (companied to Rs. 84,000/- in 1996) for PGDM and Rs. 1, 59,700/- (compared to Rs. 90,200/- in 1996) for PGDCM students. 8 Students (6 belonging to PGDM and 2 PGDCM) got a pay of Rs. 7,23,000/- p.a each; 2 PGDM students got Rs 6,50,000/- p.a each and one PGDM student got Rs 6,25,000/-. Thus 11 students (9PGDM and 2 PGDCM) got a pay of more than Rs 6 lakhs p.a each (compared to 8 students last year). The salary distribution in the offers made this year is shown in Annexure XIII.
- viii) As in last year there has been a better spread of students over various functional areas. The functional and areawise classification of job offers made to the students is given in Annexure-X and XIV.
- xi) The companies who wanted to come for taking interviews for recruiting students in the first 2 days of the campus recruitment period were charged Rs.80,000/-, 3rd to 5th days Rs.50,000/- and day 6 onwards, Rs.40,000/- and, in addition, they were charged Rs.15,000/- for each student joining them after recruitment.
- x) Summer Placement this year was good; the size of the 33rd Batch was larger at 286, compared to 187 of the 32nd Batch. The Summer Placement started in October'96 and completed by February'97. The projects offered were quite relevant in terms of Summer Training objectives and overall students' satisfaction with the Summer Projects offered was high.

A.1(14) Extra Curricular Activities

A.1(14).1. Excellent opportunities for extra-curricular development forms an integral part of the traditions and facilities of the Institute. The students run extra curricular clubs in photography, hiking, investment simulation, film appreciation and sports, football, basketball, tennis, cricket, hockey, badminton, carrom, table tennis, chess and bridge are regularly played on campus. In literary and cultural activities, the students participate in various national competitions in debates, quizzes, music and other related activities. As a part of tradition, the Institute annually conducts a QDM (Quiz, Debate and Music) Cultural Festival in Calcutta. This Festival was conducted this year also at the Campus. The students host a National Business School Meet every year with an aim to increase inter-action among the various Business Schools all over the country. This year's meet was inaugurated by Shri Sunil K. Alagh, Managing Director, Britannia Industries Ltd. and attended by Executives of Companies based in Calcutta, besides 350 students from leading Business Schools in the country like IIM Bangalore, Faculty

of Management Studies, Delhi; Times School of Marketing, Delhi; Centre for Management Development, Modinagar; Symbiosis School of Management, Pune; Xavier Labour Relations Institute, Jamshedpur; Xavier Institute of Management, Bhubaneswar; etc. The Meet featured many events ranging from Music and Dance competitions to Management Games (on Marketing, Consultancy, Production, Forex and Stock Exchange) and Quizzes, Debates and Informals. It also featured concerts by professional artists in both classical and rock music. An interesting workshop on Advertising by HTA and a series of lectures and presentations by Arthur Anderson & Co. and other gave it a literary and entertainment value.

A.1(14).2. "OPTIONS 96", the annual Investment Fair conducted by the students of the Institute was held during Dec. 27-29, 1996. It was inaugurated by Dr. Ashok Ganguly, Chairman, ICI and a Member on the Board of Governors of this Institute. 25 of the leading Banks and Financial Institutions participated in the Fair. Director and some of the faculty members of the Institute and many students were present. The highlights of option '96 were -(1) Citibank IFMEX (a Foreign Exchange and Money Market Simulation Game). IFMEX had Corporate Teams and Teams consisting of Students from IIM Calcutta, (2) ICICI Corporate Quiz, based on National and International business affairs (3) the Stock Market Simulation Game for College Students, which attrated teams from IIM Calcutta and other business schools of Calcutta, (4) there was a colloquium by Shri Vijay Kamani on "Stock Market and role of SEBI" and (5) there was a Workshop on Valuation conducted by Price Waterhouse & Associates.

A.1.(15) Alumni Association

The Association consists of the Institute's alumni passing out of the Post-Graduate Programme and the Fellowship Programme as well as the Executive Development Programmes and the Extension Programmes. It serves as a meeting forum for them to keep in touch with each other and with the Institute. The Association is based in Calcutta and has its chapters in Bombay, Delhi, Bangalore and Madras. Efforts are being made to set up more chapters. The alumni help in course modifications and selection of incoming students.

The students and alumni quite often get together both formally, in seminars and lectures organized in collaboration with each other, as well as informally, at the Institute and at the latter's offices.

During 1996-97, the Association brought out an Alumni Directory and three Alumni Newsletters. Besides the formal activities conducted by the various chapters, a loan fund was also formed for the purpose of partially meeting the fee expenditure of some students. This loan is awarded on Merit-cum-Means basis. All efforts are made to have greater interaction between IIMC and its alumni through series of activities.

A.2. POST-GRADUATE PROGRAMME IN COMPUTER AIDED MANAGEMENT

The world is witnessing an unprecedented phenomenal growth in the fields of Information Technology and Communications. Deregulation, Globalization, fundamental breakthroughs in science and the strategic importance of Information Technology are blurring boundaries in a variety of industries.

Given this scenario of the business environment, Indian companies are rapidly trying to re-structure, re-engineer and re-organize themselves desperately in order to stay in the market. We are now standing at the verge of an Information revolution which will be so profound that existing industries - Education, Banking, Publishing, Tele-communications, Healthcare and others will be unrecognizably transformed. Technology is so pervasive that it is virtually meaningless to make distinction between Technology and Non-Technology businesses and industries - There are only Technology industries and this technology has now moved into the work-place, products and the market-place with astonishing speed and thoroughness. From being just a manager of people and resources today's managers need to manage Information Technology as well. Technology and its impact on Information services, communication and Networking are increasingly forcing more and more business-houses to look for a new breed of managers who can work effectively in this environment namely - the TECHNO-MBAs.

It is in response to this changing job requirements for managers in the use of IT, the management of information and the organizational requirements of management that the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta (IIMC) designed and started the Post-Graduate Diploma in Computer Aided Management (PGDCM) in 1994-95, the first in our country. This course integrates components of general and functional management with those of Information Technology.

The selection of students is done along with the PGDM through the Common Admission Test. The candidates opting for PGDCM, shortlisted on the basis of performance in CAT, would have to take an additional paper on Mathematics, of Bachelors Degree standards, the performance in which is also taken into consideration while selecting them for admission into the course, together other factors such as Group Discussion, Personal Interviews, etc. Out of 3925 applicants, 299 candidates were shortlisted for Interview and Group Discussions, which were held in the four metropolitan cities -Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi and Chennai. After the Interviews and Group Discussion, final offers were sent to 100 candidates.

The curriculum for this course is as follows:

A. First Year:

Term I : Economics I (Micro Economic Theory); Financial Accounting;

Statistics I; Data Structure through C; 4GL & Software Tools;

and Behavioural Sciences I.

Term II : Economics II (Macro Economics): Cost Accounting; Marketing

Management; Statistics II; Computing Environment; DBMS; and

Behavioural Sciences II.

Term III : Financial Management; Marketing Research; Personnel

Management & Industrial Relations; Production Management;

Operations Research; Foundations of Information Systems and

Economics III (Indian Economics).

B. Summer Project for two months in Industry.

C. Second Year:

Term IV: Strategic Management; Strategies for Information System

Development; and four Elective Courses.

Term V: Indian Legal System; Software Project Management; Data

Communications and Networking and three Elective Courses.

Term VI: Four Elective Courses.

Mix of Elective Courses: out of eleven Elective Courses, at least three must be in the area of Information Technology. Electives can also be chosen from areas such as Finance, Marketing, Strategic Management and Operations Management. The IT related Electives include Software Management and Marketing Databases, Artificial Intelligence and Information Systems for Management, Strategic Information Systems Development; DBTCA; Management Information Systems; OOPS; etc.

The response to the course has been very encouraging and promising. Due to a smaller batch size there is a greater student - teacher interaction in the systems courses and the Programme has offered a fairly comprehensive coverage of various areas in management with special focus on IT. It has also offered ample opportunities to pursue interests other than IT which has made it more flexible.

The placements are common for both the PGDM and PGDCM students. Both can apply to any company and in any functional area. Along with PGDM students, PGDCM students also would be placed for Summer Training. Companies like Oracle, HCL-HP, Wipro, Price Waterhouse, Ramco Systems, California Software and others have started specifically asking for profiles of PGDCM students.

The students of the PGDCM programme are required to bear the following expenses:

A.3. FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

Within few years of conducting the Post-Graduate Programme in Management it became evident that neither training nor education in management sciences and practices can remain effective unless its knowledge base is continuously expanded and enriched mainly through research. There were other compulsions also. The need for analysing the experience of management in the Indian environment was strongly felt and urged by many. There was also a large expansion programme for management education in the universities and the need for competent faculty was growing.

All these compulsions continue to exist to this day. Meanwhile we have had about two decades experience in running our Doctoral Level Programme which is known as the Fellow Programme of the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta.

This experience has included a stage of early experimentation, gradual consolidation and a recent review.

We have identified our Institute's goals and objectives afresh in the context of the changing environment. We find that the demand and expectations from a national institute like ours, pioneers in the field of management education, have grown beyond the boundaries of the familiar corporate industrial sector. Management problems must be viewed against the background of national attempts at economic restructuring and globalisation of Indian business. The implications of the broad macro-economic policy changes must filter into our business strategies and management policy formulation. At the same time there is an urgent need to improve the infrastructure leading to better quality of life. This means an improvement or upgradation of public systems dealing with the management of energy, environment, communication and information technology, health, education and transport. Thus, we can no longer confine ourselves within the limits of our initial activities. Our Doctoral Programme in management education must reflect these new concerns.

In this context we have redefined our objectives for the Fellow Programme, reemphasising the need for our Institute as a parent institute for nurturing young researchers and potential academics in management sciences.

Management sciences are essentially derived through application of techniques of observation, analysis and conceptualisation, from the basic disciplines in the social sciences, quantitative sciences and the behavioural sciences, apart from the applied aspects of management in the functional fields of production, marketing, finance, etc.

This multi-disciplinary content of management sciences is in fact the strength and raison d'etre of IIMC. Therefore, as a result of our review, we have completely restructured our Fellow Programme allowing specialisation in all branches of management sciences including the basic disciplines.

We are convinced that the recognition of the basic strength and origin of management sciences is crucial at this stage of development of the study of Management in India. We hope our new curricula will attract and interest the kind of talent which must be brought in for the enrichment of Management Sciences as a full fledged discipline.

Our primary aim is to encourage a whole generation of academics in the field, but it is also of enormous benefit to Industry and the Government, at corporate and policy-making levels, where expertise of a type which combines a perception of the broader linkages along with an intimate knowledge of functions at the operational level is necessary.

The Fellow Programme which was started from the 1971 academic session, is now in its twentyfifth year and making steady progress. From the year 1980, the Fellow Programme has been offering opportunities for specialisation in Management and in various related disciplines.

At present there are 30 students who are at various phases of their course work/research in the Programme.

As of now 52 students have been awarded the title "Fellow of Indian Institute of Management". They are all gainfully employed in teaching, research, consultancy and other pursuits. Some have joined foreign universities for further studies.

A.3.(1) Admission

In 1991-92, the need to take the Research Orientation Identification Test (ROIT) in addition to Common Admission Test (CAT) for securing admission to Fellow Programme was dispensed with.

A.3.(2) Programme Objectives

The Fellow Programme is a full-time doctoral level programme in different fields of Management as well as in various disciplines and areas related to Management. The objective of the programme is to prepare students for careers in teaching and research in management or in the related disciplines and also for positions requiring continued advanced research and consultancy experience.

- A.3.(2)(i) The Fellow Programme in Management offers specialization in the following areas
 - i) Behavioural Sciences
 - ii) Finance and Control
 - iii) Management Information Systems
 - iv) Marketing
 - v) Operations Management
 - vi) Personnel Management and Industrial Relations

A.3.(2)(ii) Besides Fellow Programme in Management, there are six other Fellow Programmes in pure disciplines related to management, namely:

- a) Economics
- b) Mathematics for Management
- c) Operations Research & Systems Analysis
- d) Regional Development
- e) Sociology
- f) Statistics

A.3.(3) The Title

The title "Fellow of the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta" is awarded to the students on successful completion of the Programme.

A.3.(4) Ph.D. Recognition

The Fellowship in Management and the Fellowship in the six areas related to Management are recognised as being equivalent to a Ph.D. by the Association of Indian Universities. The Government of India also has recognised the Fellowship in Management of this Institute as equivalent to Ph.D. Degree in management of a recognised Indian University.

A.3.(5) Eligibility for Admission

The applicant must possess a post-graduate degree in management or equivalent professional qualification or a post-graduate degree in any discipline and must have secured at least 55% marks or its equivalent and minimum 50% aggregate marks at the Bachelors degree level. Graduates in Engineering, that is, with B.Tech. or B.E. degree, may also apply, provided they have secured a first class or its equivalent. In addition, all applicants must ensure that they have obtained minimum 50% aggregate marks in either the Secondary or Higher Secondary Examination (or equivalent) held by Board/University. Candidates who are otherwise eligible but are yet to complete their bachelors degree in engineering or masters degree in any relevant discipline can also apply. Such candidates, if selected, will be provisionally admitted provided they complete all requirements for obtaining the degree before 30th June. For SC/ST candidates, the eligibility conditions are relaxed. All applicants are required to take the Common Admission Test (CAT) of the Indian Institutes of Management. Announcement of the procedure for appearing in the Common Admission Test is made in leading newspapers in September every year for admission into the programme beginning in July, next year. The candidates must also submit a Fellow Programme Application Form to the Fellow Programme Office of the Institute.

Those who qualify in the CAT and who meet the eligibility criteria set above are called for interview around the middle of April. Candidates are first interviewed by the faculty of the area to which they are applying. Those who qualify the first round are then interviewed by the Fellow Programme (FP) Committee which makes the final selection. Applicants are informed of the decision around the last week of April. A PGDM holder of any of the Indian Institutes

of Management, who wishes to enter the Fellow Programme, need not take the CAT, if his/her cumulative grade point average (CGPA) is 6.00/9.00 and above or its equivalent. He can apply directly in the prescribed Fellow Programme Application Form. After submission of the application form, the selection procedure regarding such candidates will be identical to that of other candidates. If his/her CGPA is less than 6.00/9.00 he should take the written test and go through the admission procedure like any other candidate. Graduates of the four IIMs applying for the Fellow Programme in Management (FPM), who have a CGPA of 6.00/9.00 and above (or its equivalent) are also automatically eligible for direct admission to the 2nd year of the Fellow Programme. Applicants with the equivalent of a PGDM from any of the universities with a CGPA of 6.00/9.00 or equivalent, may request direct admission to the second year and this may be granted at the discretion of the Fellow Programme Committee. Students with a Master's degree or more, in any of the pure discipline areas, can also be admitted directly to the 2nd year of Fellow Programme in that area. NRI/Foreign Students can apply for the Programme and would be guided by the Rules and Regulations for NRI/Foreign Students stipulated by the Institute.

A.3.(6) Outline of the Programme

The programme consists of course work followed by a dissertation. The course work phase is of two year duration covering six terms. Waivers may be granted from particular courses to suitably qualified candidates on the basis of their prior proficiency. On satisfactory completion of the course work with the requisite CGPA, a Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (CQE) is held. After qualifying in the CQE, the student is required to submit his/her dissertation proposal to an inter-disciplinary Thesis Advisory Committee consisting of thesis supervisors and two other faculty members. Finally, the student writes the dissertation which is evaluated by a Thesis Examination Committee (including external experts) and the student publicly defends his dissertation before the Thesis Examination Committee.

A.3.(7) Duration of the Programme

The normal duration of the programme is four years for those who enter in the first year and three years for those who enter in the second year. Two years are spent on course work and two years on dissertation. Students who join in the second year spend only one year on course work. For various reasons some students require more than two years to complete the dissertation. Students are therefore allowed to continue upto four years after course work, upon reports of satisfactory progress from the Thesis Adviser. However, there is a time limit of eight years for the completion from the year of entry beyond which only under very exceptional circumstances will a student be allowed extension. Every student admitted to the Fellow Programme is placed under the guidance of an Academic Adviser to help him to organize his academic programme, specially in the selection of optional courses during the first two years.

A.3.(8) Fees

No tuition fee is charged. However, the charges for Hostel Room Rent @ Rs.5000/- per annum, Students' Association Fee of Rs.200/- per year; Registration Fee of Rs.100/- per year

and Alumni Fee of Rs.500/- (one time), are compulsory. A Caution Deposit of Rs.500/-, which is refundable under certain conditions after completion of the programme, is payable by the student on acceptance of the offer of admission.

A student who prefers to drop out voluntarily from the programme or is required to leave the Programme under F.P. Rules will forfeit his/her Caution Deposit.

In addition, a dissertation fee of Rs.200/- is payable at the time of submission of the dissertation.

The Institute reserves the right to charge any other fees upon the students or to increase the rate of any fee which may be considered necessary for meeting the expenses incurred on them, after giving due notice.

A.3.(9) Financial Aid

A student is awarded a scholarship, which ranges from Rs.1800/- to Rs.2500/- p.m. In addition, there is a contingency grant of Rs.5000/- per year payable under the Rules of the Fellow Programme. If the student's research work in connection with the dissertation involves extended field work and hence, substantial expenditure not covered by the contingency grant, adhoc research grants are awarded depending on merit of the case.

The rates of the scholarships are as follows:

Students with M.B.A., M.E., M.Tech. and M.Phil. or B.Tech., B.E., M.A., M.Sc., or M.Stat., with two years work experience are paid Rs.2400/- per month for the first two years and Rs.2500/- per month for the next two years.

Students with B.E., B.Tech., M.A., M.Sc., and M.Stat., with less than two years work experience are paid Rs.1800/- per month for the first two years and then Rs.2100/- per month for the next two years. A student normally gets a maximum of 4 years Scholarship and contingency Grant. A student can also have an extension for a period of one year at the end of 4 years on the basis of his research ability recommended by the Institute, for completion of the programme.

A.3.(10) Residence

Students are generally required to stay on the Campus for which hostel accommodation is provided. The Institute has no arrangement of housing accommodation for married students with their spouses.

A.3.(11) Placement

Placement facilities are available to all Fellowship students who have successfully completed the Programme requirements.

The Institute encourages Fellow students to take up assignments which offer opportunities for teaching and research.

A.3.(12) Course Requirements

A.3.(12)(i) Fellow Programme in Management

First Year: 15 credit courses and a non-credit course, all being compulsory.

<u>Second Year</u>: 7 credit courses in the major area; 5 credit courses in the minor area; and 1 credit course in Strategic Management, <u>plus</u> a report on Summer Vacation project/research work which is treated as equivalent to 2 credit courses (total 15 courses).

A.3.(12)(ii) Fellow Programme in Related Disciplines

<u>First Year</u>: 3 compulsory credit courses, namely, Statistics I; Statistics II and Data Processing; 9 credit courses in the major area; 3 credit courses in the minor area; and a compulsory non-credit course in Basic Mathematics or Statistics. However, students specialising in ORSA are exempted from the compulsory non-credit courses.

<u>Second Year</u>: 13 credit courses (of which at least 9 should be from the major area) and a report on Summer Vacation project/research work, which is treated as equivalent to 2 credit courses (total 15 courses).

For those exempted from the first year of course work, the second year requirements are :

Three compulsory credit courses, namely, Statistics I, Statistics II and Data Processing, 9 credit courses in the major area and 3 credit courses in the minor area.

A student from either of the Fellow Programme streams can choose any of the management areas or any one of the related disciplines as his/her major field.

The Programmes have been so designed that all the first year courses as well as minor area courses in the second year are of a post-graduate level. Most of these will be offered to both the Fellow and the Post Graduate Programme students. However, all the second year major area courses will be of an advanced doctoral standard.

A.3.(13) Summer Project

Between April and June of the first year, students who are promoted to the second year are provided with two options:

a) To work on a specific management problem in a private or public sector organisation under the guidance of a faculty member. Permission to do this is granted by the Fellow Programme Chairman on the recommendation of his Faculty Adviser. The summer project should be directly related to the student's area of specialisation.

Or

b) To undertake research work relevant to his/her area of specialisation. This should be done in consultation with the Faculty Adviser and the student must inform the Fellowship Chairman accordingly.

Subsequent summer terms are to be devoted to the student's own research work.

A.3.(14) System of Evaluation

Students' performance in course is graded on a 9-point scale as follows:

A minimum of B- is required for passing a credit course and a minimum of C+ in a non-credit course.

The Minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) standards required of every FP student for getting promotion to the 2nd year is 5.00/9.00 at the end of the Third Term.

The maximum number of failures allowed in anyone term would be two and of them at least one must be in a non-credit course. No permanent failures are allowed in the 2nd year. Further, no permanent failures are allowed in a specialised course. A student not maintaining these standards would be required to withdraw from the Programme.

A.3.(15) The Comprehensive Qualifying Examination

The Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (CQE) consists of a written examination in two parts covering the candidate's major and minor areas and is followed by an oral examination. If any student leaves the Institute before completing the CQE and Thesis proposal defence, he/she will not be allowed to continue in the Programme.

A.3.(16) Evaluation of Thesis Proposal

On successful completion of the Comprehensive Qualifying Examination (both written and oral) the students are allowed to start work on their thesis. The thesis proposal will have to be evaluated and approved by the student's **Thesis Advisory Committee** which will forward its recommendation to the Fellow Programme Committee.

A.3.(17) Thesis Examination Committee

The thesis is to be evaluated by the members of a Thesis Examination Committee consisting of two internal and two external examiners.

Unanimous acceptance of the thesis by 4 thesis examiners is required. If the thesis is rejected by more than one examiner, then the thesis has to be resubmitted. If the thesis is rejected by only one examiner, then the opinion of a fifth examiner will be sought whose decision will be final.

The student can resubmit his thesis only once. After unanimous acceptance of 4 examiners through comprehensive reports, there will be a public defence of the thesis in the presence of the Thesis Examination Committee and other faculty members and interested persons. Persons outside the Thesis Examination Committee can ask questions but not evaluate the thesis.

Three students who completed all the requirements were awarded the title "Fellow of IIMC" at the Annual Convocation of the Institute held on 16.3.1996.

A.4. POST-GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN BUSINESS MANAGEMENT (PGDBM)

Responding to the ever increasing demand for a well-designed comprehensive programme in Management from practicing managers in the city of Calcutta and around, IIMC started a Two-Year Evening Programme leading to the Post-Graduate Certificate in General Management in 1981. Classes were held thrice a week on alternate days from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Institute's City Office at 8, Ho-Chi-Minh Sarani, Calcutta - 700 071. It was a non-residential course.

In designing and implementing this Programme, attempts were made to combine the experience based strength of the participants with the conceptual rigour of inputs drawn from a comprehensive set of management disciplines. The focus had consistently been to develop such knowledge, skills and perspectives which would enable these candidates to become effective managers and be prepared to assume higher responsibilities. Based on the experience in conducting this course, the project work was made more rigorous and allowed for a greater flexibility for the participant to plan his courses given the typical constraints he faced as a working executive.

The programme was upgraded, through restructuring, with the approval of AICTE, during 1994-95. The restructured programme, known as Post Graduate Diploma in Business

Management (PGDBM), is part time, like the Post Graduate Certificate Programme in General Management (PGCGM), and it has replaced totally PGCGM from 1995-96 onwards. The duration of PGDBM is 3 years, as against 2 years in PGCGM. There are 10 Terms of 12 weeks each in the PGDBM programme (Terms I to VII, all Compulsory Courses which were being offered in PGCGM and Terms VIII-X, one course in each of the two chosen areas and one project), as against total 7 Terms in PGCGM programme. PGDBM is recognised as equivalent to MBA, like the core PGDM Programme of the Institute. PGDM Programme is residential but PGDBM is non-residential.

The fees for the 3rd Batch students of this programme are Rs.8000/- per Term, payable at the beginning of each Term. In addition to Rs.8000/- payable at the beginning of the 1st Term, the candidate would have to pay Rs.1000/- as Admission fee; Rs.500/- as Alumni Fee and a Caution Deposit of Rs.500/- (all, same as for PGDM).

58 candidates belonging to the 3rd Batch were admitted in the 1st year of the Programme which started in June '96. 54 students, belonging to the 2nd Batch, got promoted to the 2nd year of the programme. 50 candidates, belonging to the 1st Batch, got promoted to the 3rd year of the Programme. 10 candidates, who had passed PGCGM from the Institute in the past, were admitted in the 3rd year direct, on the basis of their CGPA in PGCGM, taking the total number of students in the 3rd year to 60, which was the sanctioned strength. For admission of 4th Batch students in the 1st year, 295 applicants appeared in CAT '96 on December 8, 1996 out of whom 120 applicants have been shortlisted for interview in April '97.

A.4.(1) Programme Curriculum for PGDBM

In all, twentyone courses, one course in each of the two chosen areas and a project (equivalent to one course load) based on a problem pertaining to the organisation in which the candidate is working, comprise the curriculum. The area in which the work is intended to be done in the proposal for the project would require the approval of the faculty. The termwise break-up of courses offered is given below:

Course 3 in Area 'B' *
Project

NOTE:

- 1.* In any given year, courses in only two Areas (Say A and B) will be offered depending upon the interest of the majority of the second year students.
- 2. Out of 6 courses to be offered during Terms VIII to X, 3 will be from one Area (say area A) while the remaining 3 will be from another (say Area B).
- 3. Each Project which will be equivalent to 3 courses i.e. 9 credit will commence in Term VIII and continue through Term X under the supervision of a faculty member and will be regarded as specialised study and research in focussed area of interest to the student concerned. At the end of Term VIII and IX, the Faculty Supervisor will assign a PASS (P) or FAIL (F) grade so as to effect a continuous monitoring of the work of the students; the final grade on the usual 9 point scale will be given by the Faculty Supervisor only after the completion of the work at the end of Term X based on a dissertation to be submitted by the concerned student on the work done over the preceeding 3 Terms in the Project.

Essentially, therefore, a student would be required to attend 2 courses every Term so that he/she has adequate time to concentrate on the project work.

4. After completion of Term VII a student will have to complete requirements of Terms VIII - X within a span of 24 months. The students are normally required to take all the courses offered in the sequence outlined above. They have however the option to spread courses upto Term VII over a period not exceeding 3 years subject to the condition that such option may be exercised only after completion of the first three terms and with prior approval. Also a student will have the option of not registering for Terms VIII - X and in such case, he/she quits with his/her PGCGM.

A.4.(2) Eligibility for Admission

The candidates for admission to the Programme should satisfy the following criteria:

- i) the applicant must hold at least a Bachelor's degree in any discipline or a professional qualification recognised as equivalent to a Bachelor's degree by the Department of Education, Government of India, with minimum 50% aggregate marks;
- ii) minimum 50% aggregate marks either in Secondary or Higher Secondary standard examination held by a Board/University;
- iii) the applicant should be employed at the time of applying for admission to the programme; and
- iv) the applicant should have held Executive/Supervisory position in Business/Industry/Government for a minimum period of two years after graduation.

The eligible candidates are required to appear at the Common Admission Test (CAT) and are selected for the Programme based on the following factors:

- i) Performance in the CAT;
- ii) Previous academic record of the candidate;
- iii) Work experience; and
- iv) Aptitude, ability and interest to pursue management studies as revealed in the interview.

For the 3rd year of the Programme, in future also, candidates possessing PGCGM from this Institute would also be admitted directly to the extent of vacancies available out of 60, after accommodating the students promoted form the 2nd year. Such admissions would continue till the list of PGCGM holders interested to pursue PGDBM gets exhausted.

A.4.(3) Pedagogy

Learning is considered as a two way process. Most courses require a high degree of participation and in some courses, participants will play an effective role in course design and development. Besides lectures, cases based on live problems, management games and project work will form the vital components of the pedagogy.

A.4.(4) Alumni Association

The ex-students body have formed a PGCGM and PGDBM Alumni Association.

B. TRAINING PROGRAMMES

An important objective of the Institute is to provide practicing managers and administrators at different levels in industry and government an opportunity to equip themselves with knowledge in the field of management, to improve the problem solving ability and to develop their decision-making skills and managerial competence. The Institute, therefore, conducts a wide variety of training programmes which include executive and management development programmes, workshops, seminars and conferences as well as programmes sponsored by various Departments and Agencies of the Central and State Governments, local governing bodies and organizations both in the public sector and in the private sector. All these training programmes can be classified broadly into two categories:

- I. Management Development Programmes (MDPs), [called earlier as Executive Development Programmes (EDPs)] are initiated by the Institute itself and offered to practicing managers and administrators on intercompany basis as a means for continuing education in the field of management. MDPs are not designed for a specific organization per se; they are, by and large, given a somewhat broad focus so that executives from more than one organization can participate meaningfully in such programmes. A few of these programmes are offered in collaboration with other organizations such as professional societies and government agencies.
- II. Sponsored Training Programmes, which are organized by the Institute in response to request from client organizations to conduct such programmes. Most of these programmes are designed specifically to suit the training requirements of individual organizations.

B.1. Management Development Programme

During the year under review 28 programmes were held with a total number of 346 participants. A list of the Programmes held is shown in Annexure-XV.

B.2. Extension Programmes

Extension Programmes generally aim at imparting basic managerial concepts and skills with a view to improving the participants' effectiveness in their functional areas.

B.4. Training Programmes Sponsored by Government

During the year under review 7 Government Sponsored Training Programmes (4 for IAS Officers) were conducted by the Institute (Annexure-XVII).

C. RESEARCH

C.1. Centre for Management and Development Studies

The Centre for Management and Development Studies (CMDS) plays a coordinating role in the promotion of research activities at the Institute. Apart from sponsoring research projects, the CMDS also finances seminars workshops and can provide seed-money for externally sponsored/funded research projects channelled through the Institute.

C.2. During 1996-97, the research projects undertaken by the members of faculty and research staff under CMDS are given in Annexure-XVIII/XVIIIA which indicate also Research Projects completed and those sanctioned during the year.

D. ACTIVITY CENTRES

D.1. Centre for Rural Development Management

D.1.(1) The main objective of this Centre is to examine the relevance and applicability of management concepts and systems to the rural sector with a dual purpose of improving managerial practices and acquiring greater understanding of the working of rural organisations.

D.2. Centre for Studies in Public Sector and Public Systems Management

D.2.(1) Two renowned faculty members have been selected for this Centre and they are expected to join early next year. The Planning Commission have provided Rs 1 crore for the proper and effective functioning of this Centre.

D.3. Centre for Project Management

- D.3.(1) The Centre for Project Management has been set up to carry out research and conduct training programme in the area of project management with a focus on the following themes:
 - * Issues related to project implementation in India
 - * Long-term and short-term guidelines on the policy as well as procedures to be adopted for effective implementation of projects from conception to commissioning.
- D.3.(2) A number of training programmes were conducted on project management. An Elective Course in project management was offered in the Post Graduate Programme.

D.4. Centre for Studies & Research in Environment Management

- D.4.(1) IIMC has taken initiatives to set up a Centre for Studies & Research in Environment Management. The objectives of this Centre are to address the important global and the national concern for integrating critical environment dimensions in management of development as well as consolidate over time academic, research and training efforts in this realm.
- D.4.(2) Activities already being conducted include elective course on Environment Management in the Post Graduate Programme and several training programmes on critical issues in environmental protection, control and assessment.

D.5. Management Centre for Human Values

D.5.(1) This Centre now functions from its own building with unique holistic architecture, constructed in the campus with funds raised from Industry and Business. The main hall is dedicated to four great Indians namely, Mahatma Gandhi, Swami Vivekananda, Sri Aurobindo

and Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore. Sir Rata Tata Trust has donated funds for two Visiting Fellows (one Indian and one from abroad) for 3 years. Presently Prof. Samir Ranjan Chatterjee, Curtin University, Australia (from Nov '96 to April '97) and Dr. Elizabeth Nair, Senior Lecturer, Singapore University (from Jan '97 to April '97) are in MCHV under this arrangement. UTI and ACC have donated a chair each. Dr. B.K. Chatterjee joined as ACC Visiting Professor in Business Ethics in the Centre on 1.7.1996for a period of 3 years. Efforts are on for selecting a person to hold the UTI Chair. ACC and Exide are meeting the expenses of two Research Fellows (Shri Sanjoy Mukherjee and Dr. Elankumaran). Bhilwara Textiles and Asea Brown Boveri sponsored one Annual Lecture each. Dr. Karan Singh delivered the 2nd Bhilwara Oration on 5.12.96 on the topic " The Many Dimensions of Management". The first Rabindranath Tagore Memorial Oration, sponsored by ABB Limited was delivered by Danah Zoher, Faculty Member of Oxford Brookes College, UK, on 9.1.97, on the topic "Servant Leader". MCHV conducted during the year, 3 MDPs and 23 in-company training programmes on "Management by Human Values - Indian Ethos". The 10th International Workshop on Management by Human Values conducted during Jan 6-11, 1997, had 49 participants including 19 from abroad. The workshop on Human Values conducted for SBI Officials during Feb 6-8, 1997 had 34 participants, all top officers of the Bank, including Chairman.

E. CONSULTANCY

- E.1. Besides the on-going consultancy assignments undertaken for public and private sector organizations, a number of new consultancy assignments were taken up by the Institute on behalf of different organizations both in the public as well as in the private sector. The demand for the Institute's consultancy services has been increasing. Consultancy requests are also coming from non-conventional sectors.
- E.2. A list of consultancy assignments completed/on-going during the year is shown in Annexure-XIX.

F. PUBLICATIONS

JOURNAL

Three issues of the journal, **DECISION** (Vol. 21, Nos. 3 & 4 and Vol. 22, Nos. 1 & 2 combined) were published.

WORKING PAPERS

During the year, the Publications Division brought out 39 Working Papers authored by the members of Faculty/Research Staff. With the streamlining of the production and distribution of Working Papers, the Publications Division is in a position to issue an increasing number of Working Papers. The Division has also been maintaining the programme of exchanging Working Papers with other reputed Institutes/Universities. Apart from internal distribution, the Working Papers are now being sent to about 100 Institutes/Universities in India and abroad.

The Publication Division also assists faculty members/Centres in their publication work. During the year under review, the Publications Division brought out the Bibliography on Management of Rural Development (Vol. VI) and the Directory of Organisations in Rural

Development (Vol. VII) edited by Professor Madhu S. Mishra.

Publications by Faculty and Research Staff of the Institute during 1995-96 are given in Annexure-XXII.

4. ANNUAL CONVOCATION

The Thirtysecond Annual Convocation of the Institute was held on the 22nd March, 1997. The Chief Guest was His Excellency Shri K.V. Raghunath Reddy, Hon'ble Governor of West Bengal. Shri D. Bandyopadhyay, Chairman, Board of Governors of IIMC, presided over the function.

In this Convocation, 145 students [including 6 students from the earlier (31st) batch] received the Post Graduate Diploma in Management (PGDM); 45 students (2nd Batch) received the Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Aided Management (PGDCM); 1 student received the "Fellow of the Institute"; and 57 students (1st Batch) received the Post Graduate Diploma in Business Management (PGDBM). Details about the names, etc. of the recipients of these awards are given in Annexures XXIII, XXIV, XXV, and XXVI respectively. Annexure XXVII gives the Honour Roll of the Institute from the 1st to the 32nd Batch.

5. COMPUTER CENTRE

5.1. At present the Institute is having campuswide LAN with fibre optic/thick ethernet/thinethernet/UTP based network encompassing Teaching Blocks, Student's Hostels. Computer Centre MDP and Administrative Block.

Several Pentium based IBM servers and a RISC based RS/6000 server are available in the network. Network is protected by a Firewall on a Digital machine.

Pentium based servers are running under various environments viz, NOVELL, OS2 WARP, SCO/UNIX. RS/6000 runs under AIX.

SYBASE, ORACLE, DB2, Visual Age Development environment, SLAM II simulation software and Hyper Lindo LP model solver are provided on AIX.

A 64 KBPS radio link is available for INTERNET connectivity.

ERNET connectivity is available through dial up telephone line E-mail facilities are supported by ERNET.

100 Pentium based PCs and 53 486 based PCs are connected to the campuswide network.

Additional 60 Pentium based PCs will be connected to the network in the near future.

Power builder, developer/2000, designer/2000 are the front-end tools and Excelerator is the CASE tool.

The institute is in the process of procuring several other latest software packages which will enhance our computing capabilities.

We are in the process of installing EPABX system which will use Fibre Optic based communicating link within our campus. This will improve our communication facilities significantly.

- 5.2. Besides the Computer Centre Committee which is headed by a Chairman (a faculty of the Institute), there are highly specialised and experienced professionals to look after the activities of the Centre. They are assisted by trained technical personnel [Programmer (one) and Data Processing Assistants (six)].
- 5.3. The Computing resources are put to extensive use by the students and the faculty (for their teaching courses and the training programmes). The computing and technical manpower resources of the Centre were extensively used in the intensive course on "Computer Based Information Systems" (6 weeks), which was held during May 19 June 26, 1996 at the City Office of the Institute, attended by twentyfive executives.
- 5.4. The Centre is assisting the Institute Library and the Accounts to computerise their operations.
- 5.5. The Centre has a Class Room, equipped to project Computer output on to the screen, having a capacity to accommodate 50 students.
- 5.6. IIMC is the first academic Institute in the country which has got a full fledged Computer Centre in the Students' Hostels. The entire installation is run and managed by the students themselves.
- 5.7. E-Mail service had been started from March, 1994 which has enabled the Institute to have access to all places across the globe. It is being extensively used by the students and the faculty.

8. LIBRARY

- 8.1 B.C. Roy Memorial Library, the learning resource centre of the Institute, was developed initially with a liberal Ford Grant and has grown through the last three decades into a management Library in South Asia.
- 8.2 Besides its collection of 125000 volumes of books and Bound Serials and fairly large population of reports, microforms and AV materials, the Library holds over 400 current journals and some massive optical/electronic databases. During the year a total of 1500 books were taken into stock. Besides, 100 Summer Project reprts and nearly 450 working papers/Occasional Papers from Institues, both National and International have been added to the stock. Nearly 400 current journals and newspapers were subscribed to. 650 bound volumes were added to the stock. Besides, another 500 journals were procured through the full text journal database business periodicals on disc.
- 8.3 Library continued subscription to the various databases in different media.

Seminar/Conference:

8.4 During the year, the staff members participated at the 18th National Seminar of IASLIC held in Calcutta in December'96.

Library Modernisation:

- 8.5 Under the modernisation programme, several databases and full text journals were procured. These are
 - i) ABI-INFORM-Global Edition (1986-current). A Management Database on CD-ROM covering 1000 journals.
 - ii) Business Periodicals on Disc-covering 500 full text journals on CD-ROM.
 - iii) Financial Times (CD-ROM).

 - v) Corporate Information on Magnetic Media (CIMM): A Corporate database covering Indian Companies.

Most of these databases are available on LAN. Installation of CD-ROM Network System has been completed during the year.

Resource Sharing:

8.6 Library continued sharing its resources with other Libraries, like other IIMs, NIBM, USIS Library etc. 22 external requests were attended to. On the other hand the Library procured six numbers of items from other Institutes. Besides, mutual exchange of information on various aspects between IIMC and other Institutes also took place.

Information Service

8.7 Throughout the year, the Library brought out the monthly current Awareness Bulletin "New additions"

Membership Service:

8.8 31 individuals and 1 institution enrolled for Library Membership.

9. CAMPUS DEVELOPMENT

- 9.1 The new hostel building constructed after converting the erstwhile Sick Bay, which has 30 rooms, is now being used as a Management Training Centre (MTC), at affordable cost for NGOs, Public Sector Companies and Government Organisations. The work related to i) Construction of 4th Students Hostel and ii) Extension of Lecture Gallery L-3 and L-4, were completed during the period.
- 9.2. The Engineering Division also attended to the work relating to repairs and maintenance of buildings, water mains and electrical installation (including air conditioning and refrigeration equipment) inside the campus and maintenance of the city hired flats and the City Office at Harrington Mansion.

19. FUTURE PLAN

1.1. Keeping in view the changes taking place in the international arena and the gradual opening up of the Indian Economy to global competition, to improve India's international competitiveness, IIM Calcutta has lauched special programmes to suitably modify its courses to focus on international trends and issues. Our PGDM curriculum includes, among others, International Economics; International Finance; Money and Capital Markets; Information Technology for Strategic Objectives; International Marketing; Strategic Marketing; Technology Management; Quality Management; Labour, Unions and Structural Adjustments; Environment Management; Industry and Rural Society; International Management; Mergers & Acquisitions; Competitiveness; Manufacturing Strategy and Cost Analysis; and Diversification and Financial Strategy. Similarly, stress is laid on globalisation/liberalisation issues in the Traianing Programmes conducted; Seminars, Conferences and Workshops organised; Books and Institute's Working Paper Series brought out by the faculty etc.

- 1.2. Efforts would continue to be made to upgrade further the quality of the Institute's core programmes (Teaching, Research, Training and Consultancy) to help to face the challenges arising out of the liberalisation/globalisation of the Indian Economy.
- 1.3. The Institute has been privileged to have 7 world renowned academicians as its Hony. Distinguished Professors and 4 world renowned NRIs who have been highly successful in the Business World abroad as its Hony. Distinguished Fellows. Their names are given at page 45 of this Report. With their knowledge, experience and connections, they would, in the context of the current trend towards globalisation, help us in our activities to be a global player. They would help us in organising International Conferences, offer Research Seminars for the Institute Faculty Members, address the students in Colloquia Meets and participate in the senior level specialised MDPs, whenever they come to India and could spare some time for the Institute.
- 2.1. The Institute is one of the participants in the Euro-India Cooperation and Exchange Programme (EICEP) to forge closer links with the Management Schools in Europe including joint research and case studies.
- 2.2. The Institute has a collaboration arrangement with the College of Management, Henley on Thames, U.K., which is funded by the British Council. Under this, one faculty member is on a visit to Henley for 3 months during March-May'97 and two faculty members from that College visited us (Dr. Terry Garrison, during Sept '29 -Oct '10, 1996 and Prof. Tony Knight, during March 17-23, 1997).
- 2.3. The Institute also has an Exchange Programme with the Stockholm University, Sweden.
- 2.3.1 There were 2 students from Sweden and 2 students from Helsinki University, for a term in 1996-97.
- 3. The Institute's Computer Centre has emerged as one of the leading Centres in the area of Computer application. IIM Calcutta students are already playing a leading role in the country's march towards adoption of information technology to tackle different kinds of managerial problems.
- 4. The Institute has been doing pioneëring work in the area of Management of Human Values for the past about 2 decades. The aim is to develop Indian Ethos in Management, linking values with our cultural heritage. A Management Centre for Human Values is in operation with Prof. S.K. Chakraborty as Coordinator, Dr. B.K. Chatterjee, Visiting Professor, and 2 Research Fellows 1 financed by ACC and one financed by UTI.

- 5. The Centre for Public Sector and Public Systems Management in the Institute would get strengthened when the two renowned faculty members who have been chosen for this Centre join early next year.
- 6. The Institute has been selected by UNIDO as a Centre in South Asia to train entrepreneurs, managers and Govt. officials in the area of Management for Entrepreneurs.
- After the announcement of the new Economic Policy by the Govt. of India in June, 1991, the Ministry of Human Resource Development (Department of Education) introduced a revised pattern of funding for, among other, this Institute, under which the non Plan (Revenue) Grant for this Institute during the 8th Plan (i.e., upto 1996-97) was frozen at the 1991-92 level + 10%, which worked out to Rs 3.03 crores per annum. The Institutes were directed to augment their internal resources. To encourage savings and to build up the corpus, the Government agreed to give, in addition to the normal grant of Rs 3.03 crores, matching grant for the savings effected and transferred to the Endowment Fund. As a result of the efforts made to augment internal resources on one hand and to effect economy in expenditure on the other, fund to the extend of Rs 32.95 crores (including same matching grant receivable from the Govt.) could be built up in the Endowment Fund A/c as on 31.3.97.
- 8. The committee set up by the Ministry of HRD (Dept. of Education) to review the Revised Pattern of Funding introduced for the VIII Five Year Plan and to recommend its continuance or otherwise with or without modification, for the Ninth Plan submitted its report to the Govt. during the year. The decisions of the Govt. on the various recommendations of the Committee are awaited.
- 9. The Institute continues to play a major role in assisting Indian Industry, Banks, Financial Institutions and public organisations through studies and consultancies.
- 10. Library function has been computerised. There is an Intranet, connecting the four IIMs, donated by Digital Equipment Corporation. Poweful databases like ABI/INFORM, having abstracts of nearly 1000 reputed international journals of which 500 are in full test form are now available on-line. The Institute's library is a national asset. The library needs more resources to modernise, for further computerisation and acquisition of books and for construction of more space for storage. Adequate provision for this purpose would be proposed in the Ninth Plan.
- 11. There was a round of faculty recruitment after a lapse of 3 to 4 years, during the year. The present faculty strength is 66. It is proposed to have another round of recruitment next year to augment the strength further, so that all academic activities could be handled smoothly.

- 12. The committee set up by the Faculty of the Institute to review the Academic Administration submitted its report during the year. It is presently under consideration for implementation.
- 13. The Ninth Plan proposals of the Institute for submission to the Govt. are under formulation.
- 14. The Govt. of India in the Department of Economic Affairs, Govt. of West Bengal and the Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund(OECF) of Japan have agreed to include IIM Calcutta by name as a Nodal Centre in the OECF initiative for training personnel of West Bengal Pollution Control Board and of the State Industrial Sector for building up a cadre of trained personnel for proper management of industrial pollution and waste hazards in the West Bengal State on a sustained basis. A scheme for financial support for the construction of a permanent building and facilities for the Environment Centre in the campus and for meeting the recurring costs for the conduct of the centre's activities has been drawn up and submitted to OECF, Japan. The reaction of OECF, Japan to this proposal is awaited.

Audit Report on the Indian Institute of Management Calcutta for the year 1996-97

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Indian Institute of Management, Calcutta (Institute), an autonomous organisation under the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, was established in 1961, as a society under the Societies Registration Act, 1860.
- 1.2 The Institute is financed mainly by grants from the Government of India. It has also its own sources of income from fees, consultancy, management development programmes, extension programmes, rent, royalty and sale proceeds of publication. Out of the total sanctioned grants of Rs 1343.28 lakh for 1996-97, the institute actually received Rs 656.78 lakh in 1996-97, leaving Rs 686.50 lakh being the amount receivable as at 31.3.97.
- 1.3 The annual accounts of the Institute have been audited under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit of the Institute has been entrusted to the Comptroller and Auditor General of India upto the year 1996-97.

2. Coments on Accounts

- 2.1 Despite repeated mention in earlier Audit Report for the years 1991-92, 1992-93 and 1993-94, the Asset Register maintained by the Institute in the proper format exhibited only those assets which were acquired by the Institute from 1990-91 onwards. Assets acquired prior to 1990-91 were not included in the said Register. As a result, the correctness of the figure shown in the Balance Sheet under "Fixed Asset" (Rs 2601.29 lakh) was not verifiable. The requisite extract of asset register under Rule 151(4) of the General Financial Rules was also not sent to the grant sanctioning authority.
- 2.2 Expenditure aggregating Rs 1.80 lakh being the cost of (i) maintenance of DG sets under the head "Electrical Installation" (Rs 0.61 lakh) (ii) repair and maintenance of water mains under the head "Water Mains" (Rs 0.45 lakh) (iii) electrical maintenance under the head "Electrical Installation" (Rs 0.71 lakh) and (iv) maintenance of weighing machines under the head "Inventory of Stores (Construction)" (Rs 0.02 lakh) were charged to "Capital Account" instead of "Revenue". This resulted in overstatement of "Assets" as well as "Excess of Income over Expenditure" to the extent of Rs 1.80 lakh. The Institute agreed to carry out necessary adjustments in the accounts of 1997-98.
- 2.3 The Balance Sheet exhibited Rs 198.00 lakh under the head "Loans and Advances" (Purchase and Services) which included the outstanding balance under the head "Advance Periodicals" for Rs 32.61 lakh, as against Rs 40.53 lakh shown in the records maintained by the Library Department of the Institute resulting in a difference of Rs 7.92 lakh, which needs reconciliation. The organisation agreed to reconcile the difference in 1997-98.
- 2.4 As per the Schedule to the Balance Sheet "Fixed Asset" valuing Rs 2601.29 lakh included Rs 1269.91 lakh towards "Buildings" which further included the value of the Computer Aided Management Central Building for Rs 16.54 lakh as against Rs 17.33 lakh exhibited in the Assets Register. The discrepancy of Rs 0.79 lakh needs reconciliation.

- 2.5 An amount of Rs 28.04 lakh (Advance Vendors Rs 22.53 lakh, Advance Periodicals (UNDP) Rs. 0.44 lakh) representing committed liabilities for the year 1996-97 was shown under the head "Loans and Advances" with Contra-Credit to "Accounts Payable" under the head "Current Liabilities" on the basis of purchas orders. As no transactions on these accounts had actually taken place during the year, the above adjustments resulted in over-statement of "Assets" as well as "Liabilities" to the extent of Rs 28.04 lakh. The amount of financial commitment pursuant to issue of purchase orders may at best be indicated below Balance Sheet by way of an informative note.
- 2.6 Although the expenditure under the programme "Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Management (PGDCM)" was charged to "Plan" the income of Rs 52.63 lakh earned from the above plan programme was booked under "Non-Plan" in the Income and Expenditure Account for the year 1996-97 resulting in over-exhibition of savings (i.e. Excess of Income over expenditure) under "Non-Plan" by Rs 52.63 lakh. The Institute stated (October 1997) that excepting some visiting and newly recruited faculty members, no separate infrastructure viz. Teachers, Officers, Staff, Class-room, Computers, Library, Hostel etc. exist for PGDCM students.
- 2.7 An amount of Rs 15.31 lakh was exhibited in the Income and Expenditure Account for the year 1996-97 as expenditure towards pay and allowances of the faculty under "Plan" programme Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Management (PGDCM), although no faculty had been actually engaged as per project proposal for such programmes. Pay and allowances actually paid to the faculty borne under "Non-Plan" was apportioned between "Plan" and "Non-Plan" on the basis of the number of students enrolled under "Plan and "Non-Plan" programmes. As a result, the savings exhibited under "Non-Plan" or excess of income over expenditure was overstated by Rs 15.31 lakh. The Institute stated (October 1997) that for conducting PGDCM course visiting and New Faculty members, System Analysts specialised in the field of IT are recruited not only for teaching the students of PGDCM but also for the students of PGDM and their salary have been booked proportionately under Plan and Non-Plan.
- As per the Statement of Accounts of the Endowment Fund, appended to the Annual Accounts for 1996-97, an amount of Rs 559.33 lakh was exhibited as receivable by the Fund. However, "Accounts Receivable" (Rs 717.05 lakh) as per Balance Sheet included Rs 398.07 lakh only pertaining to matching grants receivable by the Fund at the end of 1996-97. The Institute replied that the figure of Rs 559.33 lakh shown in the Statement of Accounts in respect of Endowment Fund is the balancing figure between assets and liabilities of the fund which has no relation with the figure included under "Accounts Receivable" in the Balance Sheet. The contention of the Institute is not acceptable since the Institute could not reconcile the difference of Rs 161.26 lakh (Rs 717.05 559.33 lakh).
- 2.9 As per the revised pattern of funding, the Institute was required to operate a separate bank account in the name "Endowment Fund". All contributions to the fund were required to be deposited in and all investments and transactions relating to Fund to be effected from the said bank account. Although the Institute opened a bank account on 12.8.94 but the said account remains inoperative from May 1995. All the transactions in respect of Endowment Fund were effected through the General Fund of the Institute. Due to non-operation of separate bank account for Endowment Fund, the correctness of the amount shown under "Endowment Fund" and "Endowment Fund Investment" in the Balance Sheet was not verifiable.

3. Bank Reconciliation

Bank reconciliation for the year 1996-97 in respect of the current account maintained by the Institute with the State Bank of India, Joka Branch, revealed that adjustment/settlement of discrepancies relating to past years were not yet settled. The position of Bank Reconciliation as on 31 March 1997 was as under:

2. Comments on Accounts
2.1 A separate Asset Register for Assets acquired prior to 1990-91 exists which is, however, not in prescribed proforma and the same was shown to Audit every year. Each and every item of Assets acquired prior to 1990-91 was correctly recorded in the Asset Register. Hence, the doubt of Audit regarding correctness of the figure shown in the Balance Sheet is not tenable and hence not accepted. As no separate sanction is received for procurement of a particular asset the question of sending its extract does not arise.

2.8 Audit has not given any cognizance to our reply to draft audit report which was as under:

Rs 161.26 lakhs being uninvested amount of excess of income over expenditure for 1996-97 was receivable from the Institute's general fund as of 31.3.97. This amount has been invested during 1997-98.

2.9 Audit has ignored our reply to draft audit report which is reproduced below:

The incoming cheques of Endowment Fund are in the name of the Institute which are being deposited in the general account by credeting the Endowment Fund a/c. Similarly in respect of expenditure pertaining to the same bills are raised by the party in the name of the Institute and the Institute issues cheques to the party by debiting particular head of Endowment Fund a/cs. For each and every head of a/c pertaining to the Endowment Fund there are distinct and separate leadger folios from which the Endowment Fund a/c. has been compiled. These were shown to Audit. Even after examining these head of A/cs. how the Audit could not verify the correctness of the amount shown under Endowment Fund a/c. and Investment of Endowment Fund a/c. in the Balance Sheet is not clear to the Institute.
